Monthly Meeting – 14th December 2023 Diana Dors: Film Star, Singer, Writer

At the December Meeting we were treated to an entertaining insight into the life of Diana Dors by Martin Shingler.

Diana Dors was born Diana Mary Fluck on 23 October 1931 in Swindon. Diana's love of films began as a child when her mother took her to the local cinema. From the age of eight onwards her heroines were Hollywood actresses Veronica Lake, Lana Turner, and Jean Harlow.

Physically, Diana grew up fast. At age 12, she looked and acted much older than what she was. Much of this was due to trying to emulate the actresses she studied on the silver screen. After reaching third place in a local beauty contest, this led to work as a model in art classes and she began to appear in local theatre productions.

Having excelled in her elocution studies, at 14 she was offered a place to study at London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art (LAMDA), becoming the college's youngest student, and was almost immediately spotted and put into films, making her debut in 1946 in the thriller "The Shop at Sly Corner". She was offered a 10-year contract with the Rank Organisation and joined the Rank Charm School which had been set up to discover and groom British stars to



match Hollywood idols like Jane Russell and Marilyn Monroe. During the signing of contracts, at the suggestion of her mother and in agreement with her father, she changed her surname to Dors, the maiden name of her maternal grandmother. "They asked me to change my name, I suppose they were afraid that if my real name Diana Fluck was in lights and one of the lights blew......"

Dors was given a showy comic-support part in "Here Come the Huggetts" (1948), a series that followed "Holiday Camp", playing the lazy niece



of the Huggetts, who causes trouble when she goes to stay with the family. Dors was so well received that she returned for the second movie in the series, "Vote for Huggett" (1949).

She married Dennis Hamilton in 1951. He became her agent, and by 1955 Dors was the highest earner in the UK. Fabricating a colourful personal life, he ensured that the gossip columns were provided with a steady flow of sensational stories and created the image of the 'blonde bombshell', Britain's first sex symbol in the American mould.

The couple moved to Hollywood but a contract with RKO came to nothing when the company went bust. During the 1950s she appeared in a succession of uninspired luridly titled crime films with the one exception of "Yield to the Night" when she played the unglamorous character based on the murderess Ruth Ellis. The marriage to Hamilton ended in a blaze of publicity in 1957 and

two years later she married a New York comedian, Dickie Dawson with whom she had two sons, Mark and Gary.

When her eight-year marriage to Dawson ended, she lost custody of her two sons. After her divorce she returned to the UK to find work, she toured working men's clubs and appeared in stage shows. She met her third husband Alan Lake on the set of "The

Inquisitors"; they married in 1968 and they had one son, Jason.

Having turned her life story into a cash flow through interviews and leaked tabloid stories, she started writing her autobiography "Swingin' Dors" which was serialised in the News of the World earning her £35,000. Between 1978-1984 she wrote and published a further four books under her own name: "For Adults Only", "Behind Closed Dors", "Dors by Diana", and "A to Z of Men".

In 1982 Diana was diagnosed with ovarian cancer; she collapsed at her home near Windsor with acute stomach pains and died on 4 May 1984, aged 52.



After her death, Alan Lake burned all of Dors' remaining clothes and fell into a depression. On 10 October 1984, Lake walked into their son's bedroom and took his own life by firing a shotgun into his mouth. He was 43. This was five months after her death from cancer, and 16 years to the day since they had first met.

Monthly Meeting - 18th January 2024

'It's a Dog's Life' and 'Rescue in Lockdown' Stephen Wylie, founder of SHAK – Cat and Dog Shelter

At the January Monthly Meeting, Steve Wylie gave us an interesting and a very personal account of how a rescue dog changed the course of his life.

The adventure began eighteen years ago when Steve bought his first house, so given his new fiscal responsibilities his social life came to an end, so he decided to get a dog.

On a visit to a local Cat & Dog Shelter he came across a German Shepherd shredding his blanket and "offering" the shredded blanket to Steve through the bars of his cage.

He decided there and then that this dog needed rescued, and he named the dog



Shak. It soon became apparent when Steve arrived home from work to find carpets, bannisters, door frames, and laminate flooring all shredded, that poor Shak unfortunately had serious separation anxiety issues. Not once did Steve think of giving up on Shak, and his loyalty was rewarded as Shak did become a loving pet who sadly died of lymphoma despite all efforts to save him.

After leaving his job and volunteering for a pet rehoming charity, at the same Cat & Dog Shelter where he adopted Shak, he did vow to himself "no more dogs", Many pet owners feel the same when they lose a pet but sometimes

something happens to give you a change of heart.

It was while he was working there that he witnessed first-hand what happens to dogs that cannot be rehomed. His "no more dogs policy" was short lived as he adopted another German Shepherd and a Greyhound!

After selling his share of a mobile phone business he decided to start a rescue project for dogs that were about to be put down. Kennel fees for homing the dogs was proving quite costly, but people began donating cash to help with the project. Steve then opened a charity bank account which became the registered charity SHAK, Safe Homes & Kindness, this gave him the freedom to help the dogs that needed it most.

Steve was offered kennels in South Charlton fifteen years ago, which gave him the opportunity to realise his ambition to give care and attention



to dogs literally on death row. He is passionate about giving dogs a better life while giving them a home for life.

With the help of a canine behavioural psychologist Steve has spent the last few years rescuing a variety of rescue dogs such as German Shepherds, Rottweilers and Greyhounds who were languishing in pounds and shelters, waiting to be put down.

These dogs are facing the death penalty because they have bitten people, or are too jumpy or have other behaviour or health problems.

For most people they are considered potentially dangerous or uncontrollable – but not to Steve; he sees them as dogs who have usually been let down by humans.



He has been bitten several times by dogs he has rescued. Some of them are aggressive, but he has found that given time, most dogs do come round. He has built up a reputation across the country for rescuing large dogs that otherwise would be put to sleep.

SHAK isn't like any other dog charity, they are different. Different because they help the dogs that really need it the most. Unlike the majority of dog rescues, SHAK isn't a rehoming centre, instead they offer sanctuary to abused, mistreated and neglected

dogs that have suffered so badly at the hands of humans that they need somewhere to start their lives all over again.

They are not open to the public to visit, nor do they take in dogs from members of the public. All their dogs are either strays or damaged dogs from vets or pounds. Occasionally they will take a dog from one of their trusted charity partners.

It is also important to point out that they do not actively seek homes for their dogs. After spending time in the care of Steve and his trusty staff, some of the dogs they save move onto other more specialised rehoming charities that they have a trusted working relationship with, a few others go through their own Forever Foster scheme. However, some are so badly damaged that the only option they have is to stay with Steve in South Charlton.

The charity depends on donations from the public and its own fundraising efforts via its three SHAK charity shops, in Alnwick, Amble and Blyth. It is supported by the Kennel Club and other animal welfare organisations.



Why do they have signs in hospital car parks that say "thieves operate here"? I'd feel much safer with a surgeon.


My friend told me that his kids refuse to eat fish, and he asked me what might be a good replacement. I said cats. Cats love fish.


