U3a Website



Tuesday 23 April at 2.30 pm "Beatrice Chase, My Lady of the Moor"

Talk by Simon Dell Ashburton Town Hall



The year 2024 marks the 150th anniversary of the birth of Olive Katherine Parr or more commonly called Beatrice Chase and this talk explores the life and works of this complicated yet interesting character who spent most of her life living at Venton near Widecombe. This talk will explore who she was, her works of literature and the aura that she created which perhaps disguised her real self. This year also marks the 110th anniversary of the publication of her first Dartmoor Novel

"The Heart of the Moor".

Few people in 2024 might have read her books – written in the language of her day between the war years in the early part of the twentieth century. Accused of being 'over-flowery' and too lush and romantic she courted fame and notoriety in her day. Indeed, had she died at the height of her popularity her passing would have been mourned nationally; but at the time of her death in 1955, just a few days before her 81st birthday, she has become an embittered and tragic figure.

Many of the crystals are very beautiful. However ordinary rocks are fascinating because their structure tells the story of their formation. We shared drinks and snacks including donated cake!

At the March meeting, David Sykes gave a highly informative talk on DNA and how best to use the results with Ancestry. This was followed by James Wrigley speaking about DNA in relation to MyHeritage. Both talks complemented each other extremely well. Very many thanks to these two members for giving up their time to prepare and present their talks to the group.

Knitting and Crochet Group (Group Leader: Anne Wilkinson)

We continue to meet, and share our skills and materials. We don't have much wool left now from the original donation but continue to find bits and pieces ourselves and would welcome any more that people may have.

Music Explored (Group Leader: Chris Avis)

Our March meeting was titled "Jazz on Screen" and led by Philip Carlisle who played a selection of jazz music associated with cinema films, beginning with *Now You Has Jazz*, a song written by <u>Cole Porter</u> for the 1956 film <u>High Society</u> in which it was introduced by <u>Bing Crosby</u> and <u>Louis Armstrong</u>, describing what instruments are needed to create <u>jazz</u>. Two years later, the opening credits of the documentary *Jazz on a Summer's Day* were backed by Jimmy Giuffre playing a descriptive piece, *The Train and the River*. Also, from the same film we heard Anita O'day singing *Tea for Two*.

Jerry Fielding wrote the score for *The Gauntlet* starring Clint Eastwood and Sandra Bullock, the opening scene of which is of a sunrise over Phoenix, backed by a tune called *Bleak Bad Big City Dawn*. The 1950's *Peter Gunn* is notable for being the first detective series whose character was created especially for television and is best remembered for its iconic jazz theme by Henry Mancini.

Frank Sinatra played a musician with a drug habit in *The Man with the Golden Arm*, the theme for which was composed by Elmer Bernstein. Gold continued with *The Golden Striker* written by John Lewis of The Modern Jazz Quartet for the film *No Sun in Venice*. The film *Around Midnight* is based on a composite of two American musicians in Paris. Herbie Hancock wrote the score, but he used as the theme tune the jazz standard of the same name, *Around Midnight*. The jazz saxophonist Dexter Gordon played the lead, so the music in the film was live rather than mimed by actors.

A rather surreal film, *Siesta*, about a lady skydiver, had a soundtrack performed by the trumpeter Miles Davis. We returned to crime and punishment with the theme music from the soundtrack score written by Duke Ellington for *Anatomy of a Murder* starring James Stewart. Then an entirely different film with a theme written by Sonny Rollins for *Alfie* starring Michael Caine. The familiar Cilla Black song didn't feature in the film but was written for the advertising trailer by Burt Bacharach.

Finally, Elmer Bernstein again for a film about seedy New Orleans with a rather unlikely lead in Lawrence Harvey. The music that plays over the closing credits is sung by Brook Benton, though the version we heard was played by Jimmy Smith, including the uncommon use of an organ in jazz. The film and the tune are titled *Walk on the Wild Side*, which is what Philip encouraged us all to do with his jazz music, pushing our musical boundaries into what were for some of us new grounds to explore. Thanks Philip!

We meet on the 2nd and 4th Mondays of each month from 2-3.30pm in the Town Hall and anyone is welcome to come along and give it a go.


Writing your Family History

Anne Wilkinson wrote about her father's Royal Navy service during World War 2, using information he sent home in letters and his records obtained from the National Archives. He received a Distinguished Service Medal for bravery during the Allied Landings in North Africa in November 1942 and also served in Ceylon (Sri Lanka) and worked on small boats on the English coast. The letters also included a report of learning to make apple pie and smuggling a bottle of rum home to his family in London and he sent back sketches of boats and his fellow officers.





Vanessa Griffith spoke about Midshipman William Llewelyn Griffith (a first cousin - twice removed) who was killed in action aged eighteen in the Battle of Jutland in 1916. William is commemorated on Panel 10 of the Plymouth Naval Memorial on Hoe. Both he and his brother Henry had attended Brighton College. The following year, Henry, also lost his life, aged twenty-six. Following active service in the Great War, Henry had returned to the UK where he became a flying instructor, only to lose his life in an accident at the Instruction Camp at Dartford.
