Solving payments made to branch bank account in error

As in previous years, our Treasurer and Membership Secretary have spent a great deal of time identifying and refunding doublepayments of membership fees. Sometimes because a member has made duplicate bank transfers by mistake, A notice sent out in September 2021 stated subscriptions would be paid/received on June 1 instead of previous December 1. Some members are still paying in December and may also try to pay again in June. <u>In future, we will assume each member</u> is taking responsibility for monitoring their standing orders and bank statements. Members who realise they have made an erroneous payment are welcome to contact the treasurer to claim reimbursement. But if a member makes a double payment and does not report it we will treat the second payment as a donation. This new approach will save our branch officers a substantial amount of work.

A new association between Ashford, Wye & District u3a and a company specialising in group travel offers a wide range of opportunities for day excursions and short breaks.

U3a member Ieda Hogarth is the committee's Trips Liaison person representing members in this new link with 'REAL Socialising'.

REAL Socialising is run by Viv Kenny, who started organising opportunities for travel across the UK and Europe 10 years ago. As well as having her own membership group, she also supports other groups and clubs including active retirement associations, local WI members and now u3a members. Viv aims to keep costs as low as possible, passing on group rate savings. Single supplements are usually very reasonable and, in some cases, supplement-free. Coach pick-ups are limited so more time is spent at the destination rather than making multiple stops before the journey even begins

Although the trips programme is shared with other groups of like-minded travellers, the first outing offered will be exclusive to local u3a members. (see panel on right).
