Note for No. 2 above

The National u3a have recommended a new constitution be adopted by all u3a's, this brings the contents up to date and allows the use of electronic AGM's.

We have given this recommendation close scrutiny and are happy to recommend adoption with just one amendment to the clause on the rules regarding election of Officers & committee members, the new constitution states no member can serve for more than nine years in total, this differs from our existing rules and whilst is a good idea in theory would mean two of our most experienced committee members having to immediately stand down. We believe the best make up of a committee should be a mixture of experience with a good knowledge of u3a procedures and new blood to give added enthusiasm & ideas.

Therefore, we are proposing to replace the election of Officers & Committee members section with our existing constitution rules.

Should any member wish to view the new Constitution in full do not hesitate to ask for a copy (as it is 20 pages in length we feel it cannot be included in full in the Newsletter) or alternatively both the existing & proposed constitutions can be found on the AWAKE u3a website for comparison.

Minutes of AGM – 18th November 2020

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held 2pm, Wednesday 18th November 2020, via Zoom.

A copy of the minutes of the AGM held in 2019 was sent out to all members in a paper edition of the N/L in October 2020.

40 AWAKE members attended this meeting via Zoom. A list of attendees is available.

Chris Watson opened the meeting. In order to avoid people talking over one another, Members were asked to raise their hands if they wished to speak. They would then be invited to speak. CW explained only votes against and abstentions would be counted. CW then handed the meeting over to S. Mc, who welcomed everyone.

1. Minutes of AWAKE U3A AGM held on 19th June 2019: Sue Dyson proposed we accept the minutes as a true record. Roger Coates seconded. The minutes were accepted as a true record of last year's meeting.

Matters arising: None.

2. Chair's report. S. Mc thanked everyone for attending this meeting. She said she needed to thank all Group Leaders for organising their meetings and events over the past year. There had been a good response to the Flex and Stretch group and Bridge was now being played at Willerby Library. S. Mc thanked the Committee for helping AWAKE run so smoothly. S. Mc thanked CC for keeping us all up to date with our membership numbers. A special thanks to DR our Treasurer for keeping the finances balanced. She also thanked LH for his input but he has now stepped down. Thanks also to SR and FD for editing and printing the N/L; LP for receiving and sending letters; JG for booking our speakers and SL for writing up the minutes. SMc also thanked the refreshment ladies for

- providing us all with tea and biscuits at the end of our monthly meetings.
- 3. Financial Report. DR told the meeting we had a surplus over £368 as per normal. We have bought a new Computer which has now been added to the Assets list. The accounts have been audited by Lambert Clerical. FR proposed we accept the report. JG seconded. No againsts or abstentions.
- 4. Appointment of Examiner of Accounts for 2020/2021. Les Holmes proposed we appoint Lambert Clerical as Examiner of Accounts again for the next financial year. Bob Richardson seconded. No againsts or abstentions.
- Acceptance of Object Clause change to our constitution as previously agreed. SC proposed we should accept the Ratification of the Constitution. Pauline Park seconded. No againsts or abstentions.
- 6. Election of Committee. CW said we should be proud of the work done by the committee. All members of the Committee still within tenure agreed to continue until the next AGM. DR and LP were re-elected for another two years. No againsts or abstentions. Trevor Barnett has decided to step down from the committee. CW promised we would thank him properly after COVID. As no new nominations had been received, CW asked if anyone in the meeting would like to sit on the committee. Anyone interested should phone SMc or herself for information. CW thanked SMc for her handling of AWAKE in the time of COVID.
- 7. AOB. DR asked if anyone preferring to receive their N/L by e-mail to let SR know. DR thanked all Group Leaders for their prompt payments over the past year. She also thanked TR for his help in her taking over the job of treasurer. SMc said she was hoping we could hold a face to face meeting next year. CW said it was great to see everyone looking so well. Pauline Park said she was smiling because we had managed to hold this meeting.

Wine Groups - WAG-1

Alan and Enid presented a Waitrose purchase of a 2020 Merlot from the Chilean company Luis Felipe Edwards from the Valle Central in Chile. It is a 13.5% ABV and was on offer for £5.99 (1/3rd reduction). Recommended ideal with chicken, grilled meats, sausages and pasta. They thought the wine excellent value.

Joan had purchased a Balthazar Rose from Townend, usually £7.99, on offer for £5.99, made from Syrah and Shiraz grapes from just outside of Carcassonne, Languedoc area of France a 2020 wine with a 12.5% ABV, made by Pierrick Harangue (a windsurfer) it was not too sweet and had a nice nose and lovely aftertaste, best served with a Mediterranean cuisine, will buy some more!

Chris was sampling a 25ml bottle of Pecorino from the pecorino grape in Italy. It was purchased from Waitrose, where you could also buy a 75cl bottle for £7.99 (the little bottle was £3). At 13% ABV it had a similar taste to Vouvray and could be drank with white meats, seafood and cheeses. It was very light and clear and was a vegan wine, very enjoyable.

Sheila was also drinking Rose tonight, hers was a Pinot Noir Rose purchased at Morrisons. This Vno Italian 2020 wine was 11.5%ABV and had floral and wild cherry aromas with hints of vanilla and peaches, cost between £5 and £7, though Sheila thought it lacked in flavour, it was nevertheless on her hit list.

Bob and Maggie had bought a Quintessance 2019 Rose from South of France. A Fred Sirieix promoted wine from M and S, it cost £7 instead of the usual £9 and was made from merlot and Grenache grapes, had fruity aromas of berries, citrus and peach; a super pale bronze colour



Now I am a travelling spare man with Thurstons Grand Fun Fair. My dream has come true. Home is this van, for now.

We all jump at the banging on the van side. It's coming light. Somebody outside shouts, "Sunday, breakdown time". The spare woman tells us she is the new rat girl. We three lads nod knowingly as if we understand what the hell she is talking about. Mr Thurstan, BOSS in his cowboy hat and boots strides over and tells us a spare man does anything for anybody on the field with no complaints. Snap breaks are not likely today till everybody gets rolling. Rain makes no difference. We learn Boss is 4th generation at this game. He has nine pitches of his own and six others here who will stay on to our next pitch at Farm Grounds. This includes the "World Famous Bearded Woman" who seems close shaved today and doing breakdown work.

Getting warm now as we work in all our clothes. Me and Rat Girl are to break down the coconut shy. She is Eileen a pretty little thing, I think, under all the clothes. Nobody shows us how so we just get on. We unhook the big tarp from a wood frame which we fold. Then the front counter with Thurstons Grand Fun Fair in swirly gilded letters on red. It is soon packed and stacked ready for loading with the big tarp on top. Nobody comes to help, they are all busy and nobody has had food. We are pleased with our result. A few minutes sitting on our work does not last. We are soon shouted on to the next job. Not in English but we get the idea and think some of it was "well done". A novelty indeed for me. This lark is a good idea after all. "See The Amazing Rat Girl 6d." It says on our next job. A tent on a frame with In and Out marked on the doors. Inside is a tableau of stage rocks and a palm tree with a throne like seat amongst them. The whole thing surrounded by wire mesh. Stacked at the back are four cages of energetic rats which seem quite pleased to see us.

Eileen runs off to find somebody to ask about all this, it's her new job. She is soon back with a wry smile, having got the details. She will sit quite still on the throne in a skimpy swim suit being over-run with rats encouraged by spots of jam or peanuts about her person. She is quite enthusiastic about her new job. I am impressed and love her smile. We soon break this one down and stack it. Moving the rats with care. We feel like experts already. Boss returns at the wheel of his bright red Rolls Royce Hearse with bus seats in the coffin bit and his name in more gilded letters. I do like this man's style. My father's car follows him at speed bouncing across the grass and stopping close to us. He scrambles out in a familiar red faced screaming rage of course that alarms the others but not me. Mam swiftly steps in front of me. Her grand arms folded over her grand chest, she is not for moving. Her glance to me says do you want to go with this man? My stoic stance is a surprise to the little audience and my answer is no. I am at home here. Mam now has the heavy sarsaparilla stone jar in her hand. He refuses to leave. No more words. She swings the jar to hit him hard in the belly leaving him howling and puking on the grass as he crawls away and our little audience cheers. Father is now screaming at the car as he revs it, digging deeper into the mud. We will soon be leaving in the roller with Boss. First we have to catch Nancy, a beautiful roan mare that will pull the Vardo of "The One And Only Original Gypsy Lee "Mrs Lee will clip clop her way to Farm Grounds. On Tuesday, having crossed her palm with silver, seated amongst the fancy china and lace curtains, the good people of Sheffield will see their future.

I see mine clearly right now.
