#### **Stately Homes**

A report from Pauline Park on the Stately Home visits. After two years of disruption, it has been wonderful to enjoy the opportunity to visit so many Stately Homes with our group; seven in the last two months. The residential visit to Bury St Edmunds was mentioned in the last newsletter. National Trust annual membership was almost covered on the visits to Anglesey Abbey, Wimpole Estate, Ickworth and Melford Hall. Each had its individual style and charm, and the excellent weather allowed for the fittest to explore the beautiful gardens and grounds. Burghley, in all its splendour, rounded off a superb holiday.

In August, we visited Wassand Hall, near Hornsea, a large Regency house in possession of the Constable family since 1520. The present House was rebuilt in 1815 and many of us particularly appreciated the smaller scale of the rooms and the subtle colour schemes. It was easy to imagine a family living there.

The most recent visit was to Normanby Hall, across the Humber Bridge. Built in 1825, the Regency Hall and parkland are owned by the Sheffield family, former Dukes of Buckingham, once owners of Buckingham Palace. Since 1964, the house and grounds have been leased for 99 years to the Borough Council who have done an excellent job. Using early inventories, the rooms open to the public have been restored in the Regency style to a very high standard. The recorded information in each room was particularly helpful for those of us on our first visit.

As you can read above our Stately Homes Group has been very busy making the most of the last bit of Summer and enjoying several trips out. For October (6<sup>th</sup>) and November (3<sup>rd</sup>), our

sessions will be held back indoors at St Luke's Church Hall starting at 2 p.m. There will be a visiting Speaker one month and a video of one of our Stately Homes the other. I painted Dracula, no one bought it, but I liked it and gave it to Mum and Dad for Christmas, they were thrilled, or so they said.

Christmas arrived and dad had assembled a bike for me and painted it green. "Yuk" I thought, green! And then felt instantly guilty, money must be tight and both my brother and I at Grammar schools and all the extras we needed.

January 1956, back to school after the Christmas break, snow piled high at the side of the roads, but the bus got us there and we had great fun snowballing and trying to knock each other's berets off and I was pleased to see my new friends and exchange stories about our family Christmases.
