## The University of Glasgow Research Study



"Vitamin K2 and Recovery from Exercise". They are looking for volunteers to participate and have asked B&M u3a's help in publicising among the over 65s. The Lead Researcher has promised to present findings to our Science Group at a suitable date.

The study aims to investigate the effects of vitamin K supplementation on the response to muscle damaging exercise in young and older

adults. They are currently recruiting volunteers to participate in the study – males and females aged 65 years+.

In brief, participants will be screened against eligibility criteria at an initial visit then issued with a wrist-worn accelerometer to wear for 7 days (to determine habitual activity levels). Participants will then be asked to come to the Human Performance Labs (in the Sir James Black Building at the University of Glasgow Gilmorehill campus) for 4 mornings in a row for baseline tests. Then be provided with a supplement (either vitamin K or a placebo) to take for 12 weeks. After 12 weeks, we will ask participants to come in for 4 mornings to repeat the baseline tests. Therefore, availability 12 weeks after the initial baseline tests is required.

As a thank you for participation and to compensate for any travel costs etc, participants will receive a £50 Amazon voucher.
