Visit to the London Canal Museum



On a cold but bright day our group travelled to Kings Cross from where we walked to the Canal Museum and were greeted with welcome refreshments and an introductory talk. The museum building was originally a warehouse for the Victorian Ice Trade. In the 1860s it contained two enormous ice wells which were 13 metres deep. One is still visible but only to a depth of 4 metres which still looked a long way down and very cold to work in! Ice was transported from Norway by Carlo Gatti, an Italian who had settled in London and ran thriving restaurant businesses. The ice was stored in the wells and sold across London.



The first floor of the museum is devoted to the development of the canals around London, the various types of craft that were used, the cargoes they carried and the care of the horses. The ground floor includes the ice well and part of a narrow boat, in which you can squeeze into the tiny cabin where the boatman and his family lived. There is also access to the Battlebridge Basin, which is an offshoot of the Regent's canal and where many boats are moored.

After a break for lunch we returned to the museum for a talk on the development of the ice cream trade, which was made possible by the importation and greater availability of ice. This was followed by a demonstration of Ice cream making using a traditional Victorian ice cream maker. Many of us helped churn the ice cream which we all sampled and thoroughly enjoyed. A very interesting and informative visit.
