## **Speaker Secretary (Richard)**

At the July meeting, we met Dr Stephen Goss whose talk "No tolerance of undeserving rank and splendour – the wit and satire of Gilbert and Sullivan" was informative and entertaining, including excerpts of the most notable music in which they collaborated during the late 19<sup>th</sup> Century. Even then, the Houses of Parliament became the subject of satire, much as today.

We apologise to those who attended the meeting for the difficulties with the sound system. This is being looked at with a view to minimising such difficulties in future.

In August, we will be joined by Philip Oostenbrink, the head gardener at Walmer Castle. His illustrated talk looks at the development of the gardens from the early 1700's and the influence made by various Lord Wardens, including Wellington, Churchill and, of course, the Queen Mother.

Looking further forward to September, Andrew Baker, a retired headmaster and cruise ship lecturer, will be looking at "British Politics in Turmoil". He will discuss the interlocking factors that lie behind the upheaval brought about by, for example, multiple PM's, Brexit, the financial crash and the pandemic; and how all this shapes our thinking today.

# **Our December Meeting (Jenny)**

As I mentioned last month our Bearsted and District u3a **10th Anniversary** is this year. The committee has decided to celebrate it with all the members at our Christmas meeting on 14<sup>th</sup> December 2023. More details will be sent out nearer the time, but I would like to ask again whether there are any members that could get together (or by themselves) and bake an Anniversary Cake for the occasion? Please let me know.

# **Share your Knowledge!**

We know that many of you have hidden talents and so we would be interested to know whether anyone would like to make a presentation at our monthly General Meeting. Full support will be given so if you would like to share knowledge accrued in your working life or that reflects your interests, please let Richard or Jenny know through the usual channels.

#### **Transport**

Those who regularly attend monthly meetings will know that parking in Detling can be difficult. It would therefore be helpful to others if members would consider whether car sharing is an option. Perhaps you know another member who lives near to you and also attends meetings. We know that some of you already do this but many may not have considered this as an option. Car sharing would not only benefit members but also the local community.

## **Gift Aid (Kevin)**

Most of our members will be familiar with the concept, if not the administration, of Gift Aid. Your committee has decided that, in line with many other U3A groups, we should seek to make a recovery from His Majesty's Revenue & Customs so we have submitted an application to register for this. The only change from your perspective as members is an additional box to tick on the forthcoming new year membership form, regarding tax status, and this is identical to similar forms used by many other charities, English Heritage, National Trust, for instance, when paying for their facilities. If any of you have any questions, do let the committee know.

## **Risk Assessment (Kevin)**

The Third Age Trust now requires all U3A groups to carry out operational risk assessments. Bearsted u3a is now setting this up for our activities. The Third Age Trust has template risk assessments covering internal and external, active and passive activities, and we hope that Bearsted u3a can adopt these with limited alteration. Nevertheless, it is important that members and group leaders recognise that risk assessment only works if it is thorough. So, while the committee apologises for the seemingly meaningless detail of much of it, it is the unexpected that catches people out. The committee will be liaising with the group leaders to make this as unobtrusive as possible. Again, please talk to us if you have any questions.

## **U3a Trust Chair's Visit to Bearsted a& District u3a**

As mentioned by Jenny in Chair's Chat, Liz Thackray, the National u3a Chair visited Bearsted & District u3a at Sandling Village Hall on 17<sup>th</sup> July where Table Tennis Group 1 were meeting. This was part of Liz's visit to South Eastern Region u3as. Also present were Jenny Akehurst, Chair

of Bearsted u3a; Susie Berry, Regional Trustee, South East Region; Carole Dickenson; Chrys Short, Kent Network Chair; members of the Kent Network Committee; and members of Bearsted u3a committee.

Jenny welcomed Liz to Bearsted u3a and introduced the members of the Table Tennis group who then returned to the important business of table tennis. Liz chatted with many of the members and after all the games had ended, sat down with Rob White, Kent Public Relations Advisor, to answer some of the questions which he had gathered from the Kent u3as. What follows is a shortened version of the Question-and-Answer session. Questions are in **bold**.

How do you see the future role of the Networks in the Region's structure? Liz explained the background to setting up the Networks. An early decision was made that they should not be part of the Governance structure but nevertheless have a primary role in sharing know-how between u3as, enabling u3as, providing training and doing all sorts of things to basically encourage u3as. Networks are about what the u3a is doing to help share ideas, share skills, share experiences of where things have gone right (or wrong) and support each other. She went on to say that currently there is a pilot running of a proposed council which would act as a conduit between members and Trustees. However, she understands that local u3as do not want another layer of bureaucracy.

What role can Networks fulfil to improve communication with regard to Trust members? The Networks have an important role in maintaining communications between the Trust and the members, Liz

said. Ideally all u3as should be part of a Network but at the moment not all u3as are.

Several members at the Network AGM stated that it was frequently impossible to get a reply to telephone messages or e-mail from the Trust. How can an individual member of a U3A make their feelings known to the Trustees? Liz said that the Trust has now introduced a new system which will record all e-mails and phone calls, assign them a ticket and enable tracking and response to each one.

Rob mentioned that after the AGM the Trust announced it was going to work to improve communications with the members: can Networks assist in the rollout of \\siteWorks\) perhaps becoming centres of excellence, where existing users of WordPress based systems can be available to advise other users and potential users? Liz said yes, there's a lot that can be done by Networks, especially in the link to regional trustees.

Average member age is increasing-- why don't more newly retired people join their U3A? Survey results among potential members have shown that newly retired people are looking for stimulating activities both mentally and physically; they do not regard themselves as 'old' and may not yet be interested in some of the activities of older members. All u3as should remember this when they are designing methods of attracting new members.

How can we get more men in the u3a movement? Although the proportion of men and women in the movement is affected by the normal male to female ratio of our age group, the u3a movement can attract more men. For example, in my own u3a we had an Open Day run by our Archaeology Interest Group on site at their archaeological dig. Nearly 500 people turned up and we recruited 20 new members, mostly retired men. Although it may be true to say that men are not natural joiners unlike their female counterparts, I believe that retired men are more likely to be lonely and may be unaware of the benefits joining a u3a can offer. Clearly, if we offer the right activities, we will get more men to join.

At present some u3as pay for their own websites, others have free SiteBuilder sites. What is the plan for SiteWorks? In future will the Trust pay for all u3a websites? At the moment the plan is not to charge SiteBuilder u3as for the first 2 years after they migrate to SiteWorks. During the migration of SiteBuilder sites, its cost (which is

now paid centrally) will gradually reduce and the Trust will review the position regarding the financing of SiteWorks.

Language, writing, "technology"

The growth of empires, Persia, Egypt, Greece, Rome

Religions, science, philosophy

Kings, Queens, Pharaohs, Emperors

Classical writing, plays, poetry, mythology

As well as the main topics shown above, we will cover some ANTHROPOLOGY and topics like THE DISCOVERY OF DNA AND HOW IT HAS ADVANCED ARCHAEOLOGY; EIGHT IMPORTANT ARCHAEOLOGISTS; and a few other side-steps.

# First Outing Report (Paul)

The new Village Visits group had its first outing on 21<sup>st</sup> July. This was a guided tour of Rochester Cathedral after coffee in the nice café in the crypt. For various reasons the attendance was smaller than anticipated but this had the benefit of the chance to see what is said to be the oldest door in England. Because the area can only be accessed by two people at a time this is not included on tours for larger groups.

The tour, lasting just over an hour, was both very informative and entertaining. It highlighted the development over the centuries of this very ancient cathedral. It also covered the different construction styles and the improvements made possible by lottery funding. The connections with Charles Dickens and General Gordon were also covered. The links with the Royal Engineers Regiment, based locally, are strong with memorials dating back to campaigns including Waterloo, the Boer War and Khartoum.
