Speaker Secretary (Rick)

February's speaker, Major Paul Whittle, gave his talk entitled "Land of the Gods – Discovering Eritrea".

A travelogue filled with historical content, this was a fascinating talk about the development and subsequent deterioration of a reclusive country as Dictatorship took over from Democracy, with students leaving the education system being compulsorily recruited into the army for an unspecified period of time. Failure to comply would result in the lives of their families and friends being jeopardised.

Paul showed pictures of Asmara, the Capital, part of which is a World Heritage Site due largely to its Italianate architecture and the railroad that linked with the coast, crossing a variety of terrains.

Amusingly, we saw pictures of the cable car system, built and used to move fruit and produce that monkeys regarded as a moving buffet until preventative measures were taken.

Paul's advice for anyone thinking of visiting this country at this time, is a decisive "No!".

In March, we will be joined by Geoffrey Mead, a retired Associate Tutor with the geography team at the University of Sussex. His talk is entitled "Channel Landscapes – Rye to the Hoo Peninsula".

This talk takes us on a coastal journey, starting from Rye in Sussex and following the Kent coast as far as the Hoo Peninsula. Geoffrey will be looking at some of the social history, geography, geology and `sense of place` of the various landscapes seen on the journey.

Those who regularly attend monthly meetings will know that parking in Detling can be difficult. It would therefore be helpful to others if members would consider whether car sharing is an option. Hidden London Walking Group (Patricia and Richard)

The year started with a well-attended get together In Weavering Street.

Our first walk in February, concentrated on the Spitalfields area, where the City of London meets the East End of London. Over the last few hundred years the area has been moulded by migrants hoping to find a better life. Initially the Huguenots, then the Jewish community, and more recently the Bangladeshi, Bengali and Somali communities.



The history was fascinating and we were introduced to modern mosques, the pub where Jack the Ripper selected his victims, the silk trade areas and architecture that reflected the different occupants. We heard about the history of Bishopsgate, the outer area in earlier centuries which was outside the London city boundary. The beautiful St Botolph's Without Church – Bishopsgate, as it is known, houses a stained-glass window commemorating the bombing by the IRA of the area around the Baltic Exchange Building at 24 St Mary Axe and St Mary Axe church during The Troubles, in April 1992. Huge damage was caused over a wide area.



The huge matriarch with 20 elephant calves was moved from Marble Arch and relocated to Spitalfields in early 2021. The Herd of Hope depicts the plight of elephants in Africa, and the sculptures are of actual young orphaned elephants who have been rescued and are looked after by the Sheldrick Wildlife Trust in Africa. These sculptures are placed throughout the market area and surrounding streets. Artists Gillie and Marc have also placed a new sculpture 'Dogman and Rabbitwoman on a Vespa' at the Old Spitalfields Market.

Despite the rain, we had a very good walk, and we look forward to March.

ACCESSIBILITY – there are steps leading down to the saloon & lower decks.
