In January, we were joined by Guy Bartlett, an aviation historian. His talk "Concorde – Icon of the Skies" was an extremely well put together and presented documentary that included old newsreel footage of the fastest airliner ever built and film footage (rarely seen) taken in the cockpit during flight. Together with an audio system that broadcast the actual sound accompanying Concorde taking off, the realism of the event was remarkable. We also learnt about some of the innovative technology behind the design of the plane. Guy will be visiting us again in March next year.

February's speaker is Paul Whittle who will be giving his travelogue/ history talk "In the Land of the Gods – Exploring Eritrea". This is a largely reclusive country that has more to offer than one might imagine. You may recall that in January 2023, Paul visited us when he presented his talk "The Venetian Maritime Empire".
