But more importantly, Belfast u3a will celebrate its 25th anniversary in 2025-6. So, we are starting to think of a large programme of events to celebrate this achievement and would be very grateful for any ideas and offers of help. There must be many talented people out there with a little time on their hands, who might like to join the Committee. Potential new members would go forward for election at the next AGM, to be held in May. The Xmas party held at Shorts Sports and Recreation Club was the social event of December. Over one hundred members enjoyed a tasty buffet lunch and then a range of performances from poetry to popular music, both classics and contemporary. Group News

Art Appreciation Group – from Sandra Foster



In October 2023 one of our members gave a very interesting presentation to the group - Lucien Freud and Francis Bacon: *The Famous Friendship Between Rivals*. It was pointed out that many famous artists had flourishing relationships with other artists in their field. However, there were also intense rivalries and an unaccountable number of insults shared between artists. This was the story of Lucien Freud and Francis Bacon.

Following Francis Bacon's death, the contents of his studio were given to the Hugh Lane Gallery in Dublin. The artist had Irish connections. All the contents were painstakingly catalogued and photographed and then reassembled in the gallery for all to see. In late November 2023 some members of the group visited the gallery to see the studio and a small number of Bacon's paintings. The picture below is his studio.

Earlier in November 2023 members of the group paid an informal visit to the Ulster Museum to see the Colin Middleton exhibition. He was born in Belfast in 1910. After leaving school he worked in the linen industry, but in 1948 he became a full-time painter. He established a reputation as arguably the most progressive artist working in Belfast and quickly came to be regarded as one of the leading Irish painters of his generation and one of the major figures of the twentieth century in Ireland.

To round off 2023 the group visited the Ulster Museum, in December, to see the Royal Ulster Academy's Annual Exhibition. We were delighted to be accompanied by Dan Dowling, President of the Academy. He identified a number of paintings ranging from landscapes, portraits, abstracts, to charcoal and pencil drawings. With his artist's knowledge he was able to give an insight into the painters' thinking and the techniques behind their work.

The group is looking forward to 2024, and learning more about the world of art.

We only started the group in early November when we had 3 sessions in which people could try out the game with a coach in attendance to offer advice, encouragement, and an explanation of the rules. These were held at three separate sports centres at differing times in an attempt to allow as many as possible to give it a go. There was huge interest shown and over 50 turned up over the three days.

Stemming from these sessions, it was obvious that there was sufficient interest to get regular sessions up and going. So, we have now started 2 sessions weekly. These are as follows: -

- 1. Shankill Leisure Centre at 12 noon every Monday for an hour and a half (restarting after Christmas on January 8, cost £3)
- 2. **Lisnasharragh Leisure Centre at 10am every Friday** for an hour (restarting after Christmas on **December 29**, cost £4)

These sessions are already well attended with approximately 16-20 turning up at Shankill every week and a completely different dozen or more attending Lisnasharragh. I only see these numbers increasing as those currently attending seem to be complete converts to the game. To all others I cannot recommend the game highly enough, and we would welcome any member to turn up at either of these sessions and give it a go.

For the moment our funds should continue to cover the costs of our coach, Phil Wilson, which is of great benefit as we are basically all beginners (but becoming improvers!)
