Tier 2 High Level Alert for Covid – Essex, Southend and Thurrock

We have now received advice from the National u3a about the rules for operating in Covid Tier 2, High Alert level. The table of rules for England is on our website [access from home page]. As you will know we are in Tier 2 and this now applies to Southend and Thurrock as well – so there is no issue over local boundaries. We still cannot meet inside, including restaurants and pubs.

However, we can meet outside in groups of 6 providing we operate appropriate measures for social distancing. This should allow groups such as Walking, Photography, Wildlife, Gardening and possibly others to resume same degree of group activity, providing a risk assessment is made for the activity and members feel comfortable with meeting [personal risk assessment].

As with most working class families from the East End of London, I don't really remember much in the way of presents but I know Mum & Dad always made sure we had 'a lovely Christmas with the family and friends' but one in particular sticks in my mind.



I was about 6 or 7 and a week before Christmas I was rushed up to the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Children around Hackney (sadly gone now) and kept in for treatment right up to Christmas morning. Instead of a big operation expected to have for a suspected mastoid, I was treated with penicillin, all still very new then.

On Christmas Eve the ward had been decorated with a beautiful tree and we were told to be very good and

listen out - then what seemed the middle of the night (probably about 4 in the afternoon!) we could hear singing in the distance, the lights were dimmed and in walked the Nurses all carrying lanterns and wearing their uniforms but with their capes turned inside out so they were red over their immaculate blue uniforms and white caps.

They walked slowly around the ward singing Silent Night and it was magical. I have never heard it sung better without music. (Still my favourite Carol particularly sung in German).

The next morning all the children sat round the tree after breakfast and Father Christmas handed out gifts to each one. I had never had a doll and I was given a BOY doll in his little stripy green cotton suit! (Start of equality??).

I named him Christopher! Unbeknown to me, I could have gone home Christmas Eve but the Nurses wanted me to stay for the present - they had told my Mum that the local children usually didn't want to go home because they had never known anything like that at Christmas, particularly the Christmas dinner.



I was the exception - I was thrilled to be going home for my dinner but I have never forgotten that magical Christmas Eve and always wanted to be a Nurse after that! I never did but I still love Christmas Eve more than the Day itself - something magical is about to happen!

ALTERNATIVES TO TRADITIONAL CHRISTMAS DINNER

Italian Porchetta

Prep and cooking around 4 hours. Serves 10-12.

3kg pork loin, belly attached, skin on and scored.

4tbsp cider vinegar

1tbsp sea salt flakes [Maldon – keep it local].

For the Stuffing:

Small knob butter

1 onion, finely chopped

150g cubed pancetta

10g rosemary leaves only, chopped

5 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed

2tbsp fennel seeds, bruised

100g pitted prunes, chopped

75g pine nuts

50g fresh breadcrumbs

Zest 1 lemon



Recipe:

- Remove pork from fridge. Bring to room temperature -about 1 hour.
 Place skin side up on a wire rack in the sink and carefully pour over a whole kettle of
 freshly boiled water, followed by the vinegar, allow to cool. Pat dry with kitchen towel,
 rub skin with half tbsp. sea salt flakes, transfer to baking sheet. Set aside.
- 2. Stuffing: melt butter and fry onion gently for 8-10 min, until just crisp. Add rosemary, garlic, 1tbsp fennel seeds, prunes, pine nuts, wine and breadcrumbs; cook for 2 min, and remove from heat. Stir in lemon zest, season, and allow to cool.
- 3. Heat oven to 220degC (220 fan/gas mark 7). Set pork skin side down on a board, spread over stuffing, roll up and tie tightly. Transfer to large foil-lined roasting tin. Rub over remaining salt and fennel seeds and cook for 30 min.
- 4. Reduce heat to 160degC (140 fan/gas mark 3). Continue cooking for 2 hrs until cooked through. Remove from oven and rest for 20 min before slicing.







LEMON MERINGUE ICE CREAM PUDDING (LOG OR PUDDING)

Ingredients

50g meringues
300ml (half pint) double cream
Rind and juice of 1 lemon
Half jar of home-made (!) or
supermarket's 'best' lemon curd

Method

Line a 1.5 pint pudding basin or 1lb loaf tin with cling film

(pudding basin gives you the Xmas pud effect but the loaf tin easier to slice!)

Lightly break up meringues into chunky pieces

Whisk the cream until trail forms

Add the juice and rind of lemon plus the lemon curd to the cream

Fold gently into the cream

Spoon mixture into container of choice and freeze at least 6 hours

Bring out to room temp 15 mins before turning out on to plate

Decorate how you wish (as photo)

Dip sharp knife in boiling water to slice

ENJOY and be prepared for requests for the recipe!



APRICOT FRANGIPANE TART

Homemade or shop bought shortcrust Pastry

Filling:

75g softened butter

75g caster sugar

2 beaten eggs

75g ground almonds

1/2 tsp almond extract

2x400g apricot halves, drained (reserve juice) sliced and dried

Topping:

125g icing sugar sifted, 1-2 tsp apricot juice

Line 28cm loose bottomed fluted tart tin with pastry.

Sprinkle extra ground almonds over pastry to absorb moisture.

Place butter and sugar in food processor, whizz until creamy, blend eggs, mix in ground almonds and extract.

Arrange apricot slices on pastry base, spoon in frangipane mixture, smooth top.

Sit tart tin on hot baking sheet and bake 45-50 mins at 190C/170C fan/Gas mark 5

To finish mix together icing sugar and juice and spoon zigzag over the tart.

Serve warm or cold.

PUTTING THE MORPY INTO CHRISTMAS By the benfleet bartenders

Before Christmas Dinner - so you won't mind it being late.



A variation on the French classic Kir Royal – with a little more bite. Use a champagne flute or similar.

10-12ml of Chambord - black raspberry liqueur.

10-12ml of Cointreau or similar Triple Sec.

Top up with very cold Champagne, Prosecco or Cava. Sit back and enjoy.

After lunch, a refreshing NEGRONI

Use straight sided tumbler; load with plenty of ice 25ml of Gin; 25ml of Martini Rosso; 25ml of Campari Stir and top up with a little soda to taste – we suggest 25-30ml; maximum of 75 ml.

Leave the washing up and enjoy



An evening TREAT



Mix with little ice in a cocktail shaker: 25ml vodka – cheap or expensive to taste

25ml Baileys original Irish Cream

25ml Baileys Chocolat Luxe

Use a classic Martini glass, swirl round thick liquid dark chocolate - we like to use Ghirardelli.

Strain mixed drink into the coated Martini glass Relax, drink and count your blessings.

Then, with a clean finger! wipe the inside of the glass for the remaining chocolate.
