
After a stroll round the Cemetery some of us drove to Thurlow Avenue and some walked down Rosemary Walk. There we passed the Postbox Pocket Meadow, one of our projects featured in the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust's online case study, as an example of one of their supported 'Team Wilder Communities in Action'.

We met up at the end of the Hudson Way to look at the Molescroft Millennium Garden, a project set up in 2002 by Molescroft Parish Council. Trees, woodland and meadow bulbs were planted and although the footpaths through the area are still maintained, the planting has not been managed as in the original plan due to staff changes. It's part of our plan to revive interest and maintenance of the area to restore diversity to this hidden corner of nature so close to the town centre.
