
Although we have been really lucky with the weather this year we have now hung up our helmets until next spring. We thought that this would be a good time for a review of our 2023 cycling season.

We started off in January with a gentle trip to Hutton Cranswick and 45 rides later we visited the Zoom Café in North Cave, having covered a total of 1,508 miles. Individual rides varied between 23-50 miles (average 33.5 miles). A variety of local destinations were visited including North Cave Wetlands, Burton Constable, Goodmanham, Humber Bridge, Bentley, Barton, Brandesburton, Huggate, Skipsea, Aldbrough, Lelley, Londesborough, Tibthorpe, Watton and many more.

In addition to these regular weekly rides, we had our annual expedition in June, when we cycled along the coast from Newcastle to Edinburgh, visiting some prominent castles on the way. Seven of us completed the 170 mile trip in four days. A great time was had by all – and we only had one puncture!!

Next year's trip along part of the Trans-Pennine Trail has already been booked for March – spaces are still available if you want a relatively easy challenge!?

The group welcomed three new members during the year and five of our existing members achieved their own personal milestones. Each was awarded a special trophy and/or a commemorative medal but most importantly a sticker for their bike to show the world their achievement – worth all the effort I'm sure you'll agree !! Local History

For two years now, Local History Group 1 has been researching the history of some of the villages of the East Riding. Teams of between two and five of us have been visiting their chosen villages during the summer to explore, research and to speak to locals. The teams also take photos and then report back to the rest of the group when we meet together at the Lairgate Hotel.

This year we researched Brandesburton, Tickton and Huggate. We learnt about local landmarks, records in Domesday Book and wartime tragedies, and were invited by one

local to view an original fire engine in his garage. Most importantly, of course, our researchers reported back on the village tearooms and hostelries!

Who knew that David Hockney got drunk for the first time in his life at the Wolds Inn in Huggate while stooking corn as a youngster? Or that there's a village pump in Tickton still bearing a plaque commemorating the typhoid epidemic that caused it to be built. Or that a certain Colonel Harrison, a big game hunter from Brandesburton, brought back a group of the Mbuti tribe from what was then the Belgian Congo, parading them round the country as curiosities, known as the 'Brandesburton Pygmies'. He also built a glasshouse in the grounds of his home to emulate their tropical conditions! We look forward to more fascinating and disturbing stories next summer from our intrepid researchers. **Helen Kitson**

25th January - Becoming a Naturalist (Helen Kitson)


22th February - The World beneath our Feet – An introduction to Geology (Simon Tull)

English Language for Interest (ElfI)

The English Language for Interest group has proved popular and is now in full swing after its first three meetings. In our meetings so far the group has looked at the reasons underlying some of the major changes as a prehistoric language migrated across Europe to Britain, and how later invading Danes and Normans brought new variety. Grammar and pronunciations have continued to change in fits and starts to the present day, whilst spelling has remained quite static.

The October meeting traced the development of Cockney - the London Language. Until the c16th this was the language of all Londoners other

than those at Court. Later the City was transformed by money and trade with Cockneys moving to the East End. They enjoyed words and word-play, and rhyming slang grew out of this. A rhyme starts as two words, e.g. Butcher's Hook = Look. The second then disappears and you say 'Have a butcher's at this'. Another example is 'Barnet' = Barnet Fair = hair.
