The Hundred Year Old Man Who Climbed Out Of A Window and disappeared Jonas Jonasson

the last century is incredibly cleverly designed to keep us on our toes from start to finish. The characters are brilliantly drawn, the whole premise of the book is unique.

If you read nothing else to lighten your mood this Summer, do read this book.


