Car Parking – future parking by smart phone app only.

The 3G data networks that power parking meters are to be switched off by mobile operators, some at the end of 2023, others in 2024. Some councils have already switched.

The cost of changing the meters to 4G is too high. The view is that if people have the skill set to drive a ton and a half of steel, they should be able to download an app.

There are over 30 different smart phone apps currently in use in UK car parks. If the appropriate app is not on your phone, then you may be delayed in the car park, by having to key in contact information and car details. So, prior to your journey download the appropriate apps for where you are going.

The alternative was to take the White Hart link path from Henstridge to Stalbridge, returning over the fields to Landshire Lane. It had been relatively dry in the period up to when Susan and I did a recce but rained significantly in the intervening period. This resulted in parts of the path being significantly wetter than we would have liked. Drews Lane in Stalbridge could have been renamed Drews

Stream, but it was just possible to avoid the deeper water by using the verges. Lunch was taken by most at the Bird in Hand.

We had an enjoyable March meeting but unfortunately all but one of us provided puddings making rather an overbalance of sugar. In future we will arrange for a more equal division of courses. However, this group originated as Pudding Club and very tasty they all were. Below is the recipe for a quick and easy self-saucing pudding for a cold day

Self-saucing Ginger Toffee Pudding

Batter

1 cup flour
2tsp baking powder
1-2 tsp ground ginger
half a cup soft brown sugar
half a cup white sugar
50g butter
1 tbsp Golden Syrup
half a cup of milk

Sauce

Half cup soft brown sugar half cup white sugar 1tbsp Golden Syrup 1-2 tsp ground ginger 2 cups boiling water

- 1. Combine dry ingredients in a large bowl. Melt butter with syrup.
- 2. Pour into dry ingredients with milk.
- 3. Place in a greased oven-proof dish that is guite deep.
- 4. Put sauce ingredients into bowl used for batter. Add boiling water, stir until ingredients are mostly dissolved then pour over batter.

Bake 45mins at 180C. Serve with vanilla ice-cream.

Lunch at a Pub




Girl Woman Other Bernadine Evaristo


