## Places of Worship

Our March meeting took place at Kelvedon and Feering, where we were given a most interesting and informative talk by Rev. Simon Garwood.

St Mary the Virgin Church, Kelvedon


A church has stood on this site for over 850 years. St Mary the Virgin is a Grade I listed building, dating back to the $11^{\text {th }}$ century. The north-west corner of the nave was probably built early in the $12^{\text {th }}$ century and consists of flint-rubble. A north aisle and arcade were added around 1230, followed by a south aisle (also with an arcade) around 1250 . The chancel was extended around 1360 and a clerestory added in the $15^{\text {th }}$ century. The north chapel and vestry date to early in the $16^{\text {th }}$ century, whilst in the $19^{\text {th }}$ century a south chapel was built, and the south porch almost entirely rebuilt. The building was Grade I listed in 1967.
The original churchyard is no longer used for burials but there is an extension to the churchyard on the other side of Church Street

## All Saints Church - Feering



The parish church stands in a rural setting close to Feering Village Green. The church contains many fine features not least the glorious East window which glows jewel like and contains many scenes from Our Lord's Passion.
Although the porch and south front of All Saints, Feering was rebuilt in brick around 1500 AD the main body of the church dates back to $13^{\text {th }}$ century when it must have replaced a Norman nave since the parish once belonged to Edward the Confessor.

The altar piece, a painting by John Constable showing the risen Christ was given to the church in 1965 but this has since be replaced by a copy, the original may now be seen in St Mary the Virgin, Dedham.

Our April meeting will on Friday $5^{\text {th }}$ April at 11.00 am when we shall be visiting St Laurence Church in Blackmore. This has been arranged by Jim Skelly. We shall meet at West Maldon Community Centre at a time to be arranged. There is a public house and a tearoom available nearby for those requiring refreshments.

## Reading Group

This month's book was our first American novel for a while -'Malibu Rising' by Taylor Jenkins Reid. I think we expected it to be 'chick lit' but although it was more than that and dealt with some serious issues - infidelity, unplanned pregnancies, adoption, fame and its drawbacks, duty above self interests, sexuality, a future career destroyed by medical diagnosis - it was not a very popular choice and not one we felt we could recommend to others.

The story centres on the four Riva siblings, children of the very successful singer, Mick Riva, who abandoned his family more than once, for another woman. We know two things at the start of the book - there will be a fire and there will be a party, the party of the year in Malibu, organised by eldest daughter, Nina, which everyone who is anyone is determined to attend and be seen. However, unlike previous parties, this one turns out to be the party where truths are finally told and acted upon and all the lives of the siblings are affected. The fire - well, this is where Mick Riva again leaves his mark, literally, but from the ashes of the fire all the siblings, particularly Nina, have their lives changed, a bit like the phoenix rising from the ashes. Nothing will be the same.

It was an easy read. Did we warm to the characters? The male ones do not come out of it well, apart from Hud, and the female ones tolerate situations for the sake of family, which was, at times, frustrating to read. Marks ranged from 4 to one very enthusiastic 9 , making an average of 6 . The author is well known for 'Daisy Jones and the Six' which has been serialised on television, so if you liked that, you may well enjoy this insight to 1980's American life of sun, sea, sand and surfing.

## Nature Walks



Twelve of us took advantage of a dry morning to visit Lauriston Farm near Goldhanger. The journey was not for the fainthearted. Leaving the main road behind, we followed a rutted unmade track for several minutes carefully navigating the huge puddles, the mud and the potholes and veering from one side of the road to the other to avoid the worst of the surface. Many thanks to the drivers!

We were welcomed by Spencer Christy, the Farm Director, who explained that the farm has been a charitable, community owned farm for the last few years following the principles of Biodynamic Farming and providing day placements for adults with learning or physical disabilities who work alongside the staff of 12 .

Students with special needs from a local college were visiting while we were there.

The farm of 205 acres includes a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and we saw lapwings, skylarks and a large flock of Brent Geese taking advantage of this.

André Kleinjans showed us around the farm and explained some of the principles of Biodynamic Farming. The North Ronaldsay sheep running free in the fields were a great sight. The two-acre garden was impressive; here André and his wife Monique have set up plots and a large polytunnel where a range of crops are
grown. The underlying beliefs of this style of farming seems to underpin all that they do. The vegetables, along with meat and wool are available to purchase at Maldon Market every Thursday morning if you would like to try them. Before enjoying a cuppa, we took a look at the Shetland cattle in the barn.

Our meeting on the $19^{\text {th }}$ April will be a walk in the woods, hopefully to see bluebells. Car share leaving from West Maldon Community Centre at 9.30 am to Thrift Wood, Corner of Old London Road and Rectory Road, Woodham Walter.

## The Maldon Society

Our speaker for Thursday, 4th April will be Adrian Wright
Shaking Planet - Earthquakes including Essex
His illustrated presentation considers earthquakes on a world scale including large events in Assam, Alaska and New Zealand as well as the much smaller one in Victorian Essex with its impact on the Maldon area. The way in which geological research in the 1960s led to a breakthrough in our understanding of these earth movements is examined.

Thursday, 2nd May meeting will be the Annual General Meeting of the Society which usually takes about 15 minutes. This will be followed by an Archive presentation with photographs and voices on the subject of fish and fishing in Maldon: A Fishy Story!

## History and Science

Our last lecture was by Dennis on the 'Early history of the Moot Hall up to the $16^{\text {th }}$ century and the D'Arcy family'. The first Moot Hall was sited in front of All Saints Church in a half-timbered building in Butchers Row.

The Moot Hall as we now know it had been called Darcy's Tower for many centuries but who built it? Recent research by John Smith a local historian has provided new evidence and this is published in 'Transactions' in articles from 2017, 2019 and 2022. Scientific testing of one of the bricks from the bottom of the staircase dates this to 1390 plus or minus 30 years.

Robert D'Arcy did not come to Maldon till 1401 and had no reason to build a tower for defence and did not own the land. Lord Fitzwalter owned the land and he had been one of the officials helping to put down the rebellions in Maldon and England, known now as the Peasants' Revolt against Richard II, so would not have been popular in the town. It is likely he arranged its building using Low Countries craftsmen and bricklayers reflected in the designs of the arches and windows and superb spiral staircase. It is one of the first brick buildings in Britain.

Robert D'Arcy, a lawyer, started with no property but within his lifetime had accumulated a vast selection of properties and land in Maldon and surrounds including the Tower and adjacent mansion. Later in the 1500s his grandson sold off the properties to Edward VI and Mary and Elizabeth in order to buy St. Osyth's Priory and lands and become the Baron. Much more information was given about the family and its links to the Tower and Maldon sites. Royalty sold the properties to private owners and eventually the Tower was sold to the Corporation and became the Moot Hall and prison.

Our April meeting is a visit to Purfleet Magazine (gunpowder production), Museum and Heritage centre. It includes several displays about local history, both world wars and a special section on the Gurkha Regiment. On Wednesday April $10^{\text {th }}$ we will meet at 9.30 am at West Maldon Community Centre and go by car share for a guided visit after refreshments at 10.30 . There is a café nearby for lunch. ## Community in the Cup

I am sure many of you will have heard of Community in the Cup but not necessarily understood what it is nor the involvement that Blackwater u3a has.

Community in the Cup has operated on a National Basis for several years and in Maldon for about 15 months. It is a monthly meeting organised by the Longfields Medical Centre with the assistance of The Maldon United Reformed Church. Although organised by a medical centre it does not attempt to offer a clinical service. The whole ethos is to get local charities and statutory bodies who offer services to meet the social needs of the community which enable them to function in their homes.

The leader from the Longfields Medical Centre is a Social Prescribing Nurse, Sarah Osborn. Her role is to bring together the local community and the services, statutory and voluntary, which are available to all in a relaxed atmosphere over a cup of tea and biscuit, all free. Some of the services which attend on a regular basis include

The Fire Brigade, Guide Dogs for the Blind, u3a, Age Concern, Parkinson Society, Maldon CVS, the Police, Carers, Macmillan and Dementia charities.

The Maldon URC offer the peaceful venue, the free unlimited tea and coffee, which is supplied by Tesco, and a listening, non judgemental ear for those who have the need. In addition, they provide the opportunity for those who attend to undertake some form of craft - decorating stones seems to be the current favourite - but there are others.

What do we do? At every meeting we have a table with leaflets and copies of our magazine manned by two members. Our role is to explain what the ethos of the u3a is and what it offers in Maldon. We are not 'selling' Blackwater specifically but the u3a movement in general. Naturally we tend to emphasise our u3a and we have recruited several new members. Currently there are six Blackwater members on the rota, meaning each is on duty once in 3 months, but we do have a need for extra volunteers; it is amazing how often an Interest Group meeting clashes with The Community in The Cup meeting, which is the last Tuesday of the month at 10.00 am until noon.
