## **Art Appreciation**

#### Visit to Geedon Gallery

In October we visited our favourite local gallery, the Geedon Gallery in Fingringhoe for their autumn exhibition. Well over a hundred paintings and etchings plus a collection of ceramics, bronze resin animal sculptures, wood carvings and jewellery all from contemporary artists.

As always we chose our favourite three items of art work and collected the results. The winning artist was Margaret Glass with four paintings, The Map Room at Great Dixter, Towards Aldeburgh, Staithes Harbour and Spring Sunlight Provence. The single painting with the most votes was by Ruth Stage called Evening Swimmers Burnham Overy Staithe with an egg tempera medium. Other artists with high votes were Janet French, and Andrew King. The wooden bowls were also popular. I thought the most intriguing art was by Janet French with a highly innovative technique of taking field maple or oak leaves plus their stalks and processing them to a clear structure followed by arranging them to create a virtual rectangle picture size and then doing a screen print on top.

Thanks to Jacky Taber, the owner, who always welcomes us for collecting such a good exhibition of art for sale.

In November we watched two DVDs on Michelangelo. The first on his time in Florence and the second from his time in Rome. These are by Professor Kloss in the series we have watched on Italian Renaissance artists. Some of the greatest sculptures of all time.

I would really appreciate it in the true spirit of the u3a if some of the group would volunteer to give a talk on an artist or school of art. I can always help with the creation of the pictures for the computer and the talk could be for 45mins or 20 mins and share with other speakers.

Peter explained the four appellations for this region, which are AOC Côtes du Rhone (the lowest); AOC Côtes du Rhone Villages; AOC Côtes du Rhone Villages + a name; and the best wine being designated Crus AOC + a name.





The tendency is to automatically think of rich reds such as Chateauneuf du Pape and Crozes Hermitage, so we were all surprised at the variety of white wines produced in this region. The biggest surprise was to find a white Chateauneuf du Pape! It was absolutely delicious with a subtle, creamy nose, and tastes of vanilla, peaches and apricots. Every wine sampled was enjoyable but maybe that was my favourite.

We had a dry and sunny morning at the Hanningfield Essex Wildlife Trust reserves for our recent visit. Gone was the welcoming wood burning stove in the corner and replaced with a large cabinet filled with an extensive range of scopes and binoculars. sight when entering the visitors centre. The centre has had a makeover. Many more shelves of merchandise were on display and plenty of cake to go with our hot drinks.

The squirrels' antics, stealing the bird food, was much in evidence, to the delight of children and adults alike. The creatures seem to sense the glass provides protection for them therefore inside movement doesn't bother them

We reached the second hide after a poor showing of birds at the first one, and it didn't disappoint. The curved inlet sheltered many ducks, Widgeon, Gadwall, Black tailed Godwits, an assortment of gulls and large numbers of our smallest and I believe prettiest of ducks, the Teal.

Our garden has produced 2 Goldcrests and a large flock of Long Tailed Tits in recent days. The Silver Birch are holding on to their lovely golden leaves and are supplying the birds with much of their dietary needs. The Fieldfare and Redwing, having arrived some weeks ago, are instantly recognisable by their distinctive repetitive clucking sound.

This month we all enjoyed reading 'Still me', the third book in a trilogy by Jojo Moyes where we follow the latest exploits of Louisa Clark, who is starting a new job as a personal assistant to the wife of a wealthy New York business man.

Although the story can stand alone it does help for background if you have read the previous two books - 'Me before you' and 'After You'. Louisa is a delightful and endearing character with her own unique fashion style. She becomes a strong, discreet and loyal ally to her mistress, Agnes, who has to deal with spiteful jealousy from other society wives but, sadly, she is dismissed when she quietly takes the blame for something Agnes has done. She becomes friends with a cantankerous tenant (Margot de Witt) in the apartment building after finding her dog on the loose again and, on returning the dog, discovers the old lady collapsed. Now homeless, she is taken in by Margot, becoming her dog walker and carer and discovers a wealth of fashionable clothes which Margot has collected over the years. Louisa has two suitors, Sam, the paramedic boyfriend she has left in England and Josh, the handsome American, who reminds her of her previous great love, Will. Neither relationship is smooth sailing but if you like the film, 'Sleepless in Seattle', you will be pleased with the ending. 
This was an amusing play with a few small parts and a great deal of reading by the rest of the Group.



There were ten of us so that was three groups, two of three and one of four members. Marg won in her group, Janet won in her group and I won in my group.


Marg was the winner of all the groups so well done; you have to use your brain which is good for you and take your time for the next move.

## **STEAM Group**

For our November meeting, Dennis gave us a really interesting and thought-provoking talk on Genetic Engineering or Genetic Modification (GM) – how it's done, what are the potential benefits and what are the risks. Dennis explained that by extracting a minute particle of DNA and replacing it with a different particle it is possible to change the characteristics of a plant or animal. This is a highly complex process and, although banned in the UK, has been carried out successfully in the USA for over 30 years.

The benefits achieved so far are mainly to do with crop resistance to disease and insect damage but herbicide tolerance can also be achieved, making weed control easier.

The dangers are that pollen from the GM crop can get carried to adjacent fields causing GM weeds to grow which can be very difficult to control. In animals, GM has been used to increase meat and milk production but this process is quite controversial.

#### **History and Science Group**

On a dark rainy day we had an excellent speaker to talk us through the history of the modern Fire Brigade. In 1966 Keith joined the fire brigade and then started many years training in the various aspects of not just fire fighting and rescue, but car, train, water and even cat rescue. His first slide showed us Victorian fire engine with 70ft ladders that had to be extracted from the fire engine and manually wheeled into place. A fireman was dressed in plastic over trousers which could melt. In 1976 the ladders were still in use.

A 4-year apprenticeship taught many skills including breathing apparatus, and climbing up to a 3 story building to rescue trapped people with just a hook over the top window sill. Keith then showed slides of the rescue of people in the Rowan Point disaster, bombed hotels during the IRA campaign and the Moorgate train crash in 1979 where 49 people died. Nowadays with health and safety considerations, a number of the old practices have been modified.

We have organised an extra meeting on Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> December at 2.00 pm. Most people are fascinated by the Maya civilisation of Central America. We are very fortunate to get hold of a world expert Archaeologist / Anthropologist John Walden (yes, son of our Liz Walden). He is a Post Doctoral Scholar in the Department of Anthropology at Harvard University. He currently directs fieldwork at a Late Classic Maya Centre in the Belize River Valley. He will cover the history and development of the Maya from humble beginings, as villages around 1,000 B.C. through the time of chiefdoms and the building of pyramids, to the collapse of the Maya around 1,000 A.D. This reconstruction of ancient life in the region is based on a number of archaeological approaches, from traditional survey and excavation through to cutting edge genetics.

This will probably be very popular so it will be first come first served if you have booked with me or signed up at the monthly meeting. The Linton Room will only take so many. The January meeting will be on 9<sup>th</sup> at 2.00 pm and Dennis will be showing two History DVDs. 'Daily Life in the 13<sup>th</sup> century' - a time when life could be violent but the Parish was so important. It was a time of great building of our Parish churches. The second DVD is 'The disastrous reign of Henry III'. Henry and the Barons were still arguing post Magna Carta who should run the country and we have the early development of Parliament.



## **Cardmaking Group**


