Recipe: Three Ingredient Cooking (Hilary Wrightman)

Cheat's Sourdough Rolls

240 gm self-raising flour 200 ml semi-skimmed milk 5 tablespoons mayonnaise

Pre heat oven to 200c or 180c with fan oven.

- 1. Grease 2 baking sheets and line with greaseproof paper.
- 2. Sift the flour into the bowl and slowly add the milk, stirring constantly.
- 3. Add the mayonnaise and mix vigorously to get rid of any lumps.
- 4. The batter should be thick but runny, and when you lift the spoon out, you should be able to see elastic threads forming this is the raising agent in the flour starting to work.
- 5. Drop heaped dessert spoons of the mixture on to the baking sheets, spacing them 4–5 cm apart. Use a spoon to round off the edges and neaten the top.

Bake for 30-35 minutes, or until the rolls have risen and started to brown.

Swap the trays half-way through the cooking time to ensure they are evenly cooked.

Cool on a wire rack before serving.

The rolls should keep up to 4 days in an airtight tin, or you can freeze them for up to a month.

Craft Group (Fiona Lucas)

In May, our Group revisited a Craft that we last tackled over three years ago – folding Iris cards. Iris folding is a card making technique that involves layering folded paper strips across a cut out shape following a printed pattern. Usually the paper strips form a 'swirl' shape, leaving a hole in the middle, just like the iris of a camera, which is how the technique got its name.

It can be tricky to get used to the layering technique and following the pattern, but after a while everyone got the hang of it and created some lovely cards!

Local Visit to Gilwell Park (Yvonne Hall)

Our local visit this May was to Gilwell Park. It was a lovely day, just right for a nice walk with our guide, Zoe. With her notes, Zoe did very well, as she is very new to the job.

The earliest record of Gilwell is in 1407 called 'Gyldiefords'. In 1422, it's name changes to Gillrolfes. By the end of 1400s the name was Gilwell. In around 1736, Dick Turpin lived in a cottage next to Gilwell Green; by 1739 he was tried and executed in York.

The estate changed hands a few times. A previous owner added to the garden some balustrades (Zoe called it a fence) of the old London Bridge, which makes a nice feature facing the White House, which was restored and opened by Queen Elizabeth in 1995.

In 1919, Gilwell Park became a place for the Scouts. Places of worship of different faiths have been added to the site. There were scout and school groups adding to the site atmosphere.

For our May outing, a group of fifteen keen photographers enjoyed a riverside walk "East of Tower Bridge". Originally billed as a Riverside Pub Walk the route was expanded to encompass more of the Thames Path, south then north of the River.

Starting from Tower Hill tube station we crossed Tower Bridge and turned east along Butlers Wharf and followed the Thames Path to Rotherhithe passing the Angel and The Mayflower pubs. From here we took the Overground Line under the Thames (bizarre I know!) to Wapping where we continued our walk eastwards towards The Prospect of Whitby. Possibly one of the most famous pubs in London, it dates from 1543 and has a hangman's noose swinging over the river. This is a nod to Judge Jeffreys also known as the "Hanging Judge", one of the more notorious customers of the pub during the late 1600s.

We retraced our steps back toward Wapping where we stopped for an enjoyable lunch at the Captain Kidd before heading back to Tower Hill via St Katharine Docks.


To join the Photography Group, no special expertise or equipment is normally required and members with no interest in photography are welcome to join us purely for the outings. We have visited some very interesting locations in London.

History Group (Peter Spencer)

Incompetent Hangmen

In 1719 Richard Arnett was appointed London's hangman after the previous one had himself been hanged for stealing. Late for his first job the impatient crowd threw him into a horse pond. The three condemned men were returned to Newgate prison.

The following year he arrived so drunk that he first tried to hang a catholic priest who had come to administer the last rites. The platform then collapsed, and three officials fell ten feet on top of the prisoners.

In later years he hanged two notorious criminals, Jack Sheppard and Jonathan Wilde, but took so long with his preparations that Wilde's gang of pick pockets were able to relieve many of the spectators of their watches and wallets.

In 1810 there were 222 capital crimes in England.

(1) Opera Delights – Felici Opera at Copped Hall (Mary Nathan)

(2) Brick Lane Music Hall (Hilary Wrightman)



Join us for an outing to Brick Lane Music Hall for a matinée performance on Thursday 28th September from 2.00 pm to 5.00 pm of "Divas" – a celebration of glamour and music to honour Judy Garland, Barbara Streisand and Shirley Bassey, to name a few.

The cost will be £47.50 per person, which includes Full Afternoon Cream Tea served during the interval.

(3) Visit to Goldsmiths' Hall (Hilary Wrightman)



We are very fortunate in being able to visit The Goldsmiths' Hall in the City of London. We have been given a slot at 12.30pm on 30th October. (If there are a lot of members wanting to go but all the tickets have been allocated, I will apply for further tickets but for another day (most likely to be next year).)

The Hall is not open to the public, except when guided tours of the Hall are arranged. The tours last approximately one hour. The ticket is non-transferable and non-refundable, and the cost goes to the Goldsmiths' charity.

We also have the opportunity of visiting beforehand or after the tour The Goldsmith's Hall Garden, which is opposite the Hall. The garden houses the famous symbol relating to the Worshipful Company of Goldsmiths. The leopard's head hallmark literally means "marked at Goldsmith's Hall" and has been used to verify the purity of silver since the early 14th Century. The garden is on the site of the church and churchyard of St John Zachary, recorded from at least the 12th Century. The land was acquired in 1339, to build the earliest recorded Livery Hall.

We are having morning coffee and cake **at 11.00am** at the Lord Raglan Pub, St Martin's le-Grand, Holborn, which is a few minutes' walk from the Hall.

(5) Possible Visit to Maastricht in 2024 (Hilary Wrightman)

The dates aren't released until late September, so I am unable to quote exact dates and prices at present.

A 3-night stay in a 4-star hotel on a bed and breakfast basis, including travel by Eurostar, all coach travel and basic tickets to the concert will be approximately between £1000-£1200 per person. (this is taking 2023 prices and adding a bit extra for price rises). It may be possible to make monthly stage payments once deposits have been paid.

Other u3a Visits (Wanstead & Woodford u3a)

Wanstead and Woodford u3a have given us the opportunity to join them on these visits:

19th **July - Battle and Hastings** This trip starts first at Battle (with entrance to Battle Abbey included), with time to explore and have lunch then on to Hastings for tea. Departure time from Hastings is 5.00pm, with the journey expected to take about an hour and a half (traffic depending). Cost £30.00.

6th September - Fishbourne Palace and Hayling Island This trip starts at Hayling Island with free time to explore and have lunch, then on to Fishbourne. Fishbourne is the largest and oldest Roman villa unearthed in Europe. Departure from Fishbourne is 5.00pm, with the journey expected to take about 2 hours (traffic depending). Cost £34.00 includes entrance fees.

11th October - Highgrove and Tetbury

Garden tours have been arranged for 12.00 and 12.30pm. Leaving Highgrove at 1.45pm for Tetbury with the option of lunch and tea there. Departure time from Tetbury is 5.00pm, with the journey expected to take about two and a half hours (traffic depending). Cost: £42.00.

ID is required for this visit to Highgrove: either Passport, Driving Licence or Utility Bill.

Departure point for all these visits is 9.00 am at the Sir James Hawkey Hall, Broomhill Road, Woodford Green, Essex, IG8 OBG. Parking is possible either on local roads or in the adjacent car park (RingGo No 7110 – (Sir James Hawkey Hall Car Park 18)).
