## Meetings Programme

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### January Meeting Report

The speaker at our January meeting was John Smith, whose topic was "Body Language - Not what you say - but how you say it ". An award-winning speaker and former teacher at Carlton-le-Willows school, John began his slide presentation by explaining, with images of Princes Charles and Harry, how we may unconsciously protect the vulnerable mid-torso area, Charles by adjusting the shirt cuff on his opposing arm, and Harry by holding his hand in front of his body. John also suggested that arms crossed over the chest can indicate a person is being defensive or that the individual with crossed arms disagrees with the opinions or actions of other individuals with whom they are communicating, that a hand placed on the cheek may indicate a person is lost in thought, or is considering something or, if accompanied by a furrowed brow, demonstrates deep concentration, that a head tilted to one side demonstrates a person is listening keenly. When someone touches or rubs their nose, it can, apparently, signify a number of things; it can be a signal of disbelief or rejection, or it can also demonstrate that an individual is being untruthful about what they are saying. Placing the tips of the fingers together, "Steepling" the fingers, or placing the tips of them together, shows control and authority. This type of body language can be used by bosses or authority figures to subtly demonstrate that they are running things. Palms open, facing upward. An open palm is a sign of openness and honesty, but it can be a show of submission - in older days when many people carried weapons, this was used to show that they were not holding one - or of sincerity and innocence.



John also covered dominance of space, examples being a man sitting wide-legged on a train, or the oddly-posed "Power Stance" used by politicians (David Cameron, George Osborne, Theresa May, Sajid Javid, and Vladimir Putin) and Kings (Henry VIII). Handshakes can also express dominance, and John showed a short, amusing video of Presidents Trump and Macron shaking hands, in which Macron deliberately tried to dominate the action by holding on to Trump's hand for longer than necessary, obviously irritating the American.

John gave examples of the importance of body language and how it influences perceptions. One was of a television debate between Richard Nixon and John Kennedy. Nixon, then Vice President had recently suffered a bout of the flu and was still running a low fever; he had nonetheless spent a gruelling day on the campaign trail and looked drained. Kennedy, meanwhile, had been in a hotel with his aides for an entire weekend, fielding practice questions and resting. Despite Nixon's exhaustion and Kennedy's preparedness, the Republican and Democrat were more or less evenly matched when it came to substance. Each held forth skilfully and presented remarkably similar agendas. Both emphasized national security, the threat of communism, the need to strengthen the U.S. military and the importance of building a brighter future for America; indeed, after Kennedy's opening statement, Nixon said, "I subscribe completely to the spirit that Senator Kennedy has expressed tonight." And yet, while most radio listeners called the first debate a draw or pronounced Nixon the victor, Kennedy won over the 70 million television viewers by a broad margin.

An interesting, thought-provoking talk.

With so many farmers due to retire within the next decade, the agricultural industry needs 60,000 new people to work in the sector by 2020. This presentation is interesting and informative, and contains many fascinating facts, and video clips.

## Beer and Cider Tasting Group - Thursday January 17th

There was a good turnout for our January trip; 22 of us in all. Thankfully, the roadworks in BJ had been completed, so the Pathfinder 100 bus arrived in the right place and more-or-less on time, and this month's pubs were chosen for proximity to the King Street bus stop in case of wintry weather, so we didn't have to wander far. Our first venue was *Langtrys*, an old established and well loved Nottingham watering hole, dating back to the eighteenth century and formerly known as The Peach Tree. The pub has recently been renovated and the name changed again (from "Langtrys" to "Lily Langtry's" – why bother???) In the bar areas, evidence of renovation was minimal. However, the toilets, which have long attracted adverse comment, have been very much improved. As is usually the case in this pub, the beers sampled were in fine condition. The Sharps' "Doombar" and Blue Monkey "Infinity" were both very good and the Oakham Ales "Bishops Farewell" was excellent. The cider choice was disappointing in Lily Langtry's however, only Strongbow being available.

There was more choice of ciders in the pub next door, *The Hop Merchant*, including the ever-reliable "Old Rosie" (a bit strong at 7.5% ABV) and a more reasonable "Orchard Thieves" (4.5%), which was felt to be a bit underwhelming (described as Strongbow-like). The St Austell "Tribute" beer was excellent at The Hop Merchant as was the **Erdinger Alkoholfrei** wheat bier, which was being drunk by one of our group who has been following an alcohol-free regime this January. I came across the Erdinger myself, by accident, a few months ago. I was bought a bottle of the stuff and drank most of it before I realised that it was "Alkoholfrei"!!! Unlike many of the alcohol-free brews, it tasted OK, like a good German beer. Apparently it contains vitamins B12 and folic acid, and has isotonic properties, and less than 0.5% ABV, so that's all good, isn't it? It is encouraging that the pub trade is taking the alcohol-free stuff more seriously and I have sought it out ever since if I happen to be driving. It's also available in most supermarkets. ### **The Hound of the Baskervilles**



## **Earth Observation Satellites and Global Positioning Systems, Linguistics and Ageing Muscles - A review of the University Interest Group’s activities**

Satellites, linguistics and muscle ageing, these are some of the lectures that over 260 people from our U3A have learnt about over the past 16 months. The talks (8 in total so far) from eminent university academics have also included driverless cars, sustainable chemistry, English place names and Eco-Energy homes. All trips have been fully booked very quickly. The last talk on Earth Observation, as an example, getting 50 requests to attend within 24 hours with only 35 places available.



In addition, a growing number of people are taking part in research projects and attending public talks by the local universities (information circulated by the group). Members have participated in research projects including muscle ageing, linguistics and the impacts of retirement on health. Very recently we have set several case studies for Psychology Masters course students at Nottingham Trent to investigate volunteer recruitment and well-being in U3A’s.

In all cases we are making a very positive contribution to the University both in their research and helping students in a very personal and useful way. People report that they are delighted to be experiencing talks from such eminent and knowledgeable academics which are usually followed by demonstrations or talks by PhD students. Talks are not over academic but neither are they dumbed down. They go into some detail that lay people such as ourselves can understand.

Future visits being planned include a trip to Brackenhurst veterinary college, a talk on osteoporosis and the issue of trust with the internet, particularly for older people.

### Visit to the Earth Observation Dept at Nottingham University - 14th January

This interesting talk was presented by Professor Stuart Marsh, an internationally recognised expert in developing geoscience applications for Earth Observation, who is Professor of Geospatial Engineering at the University. Most people have turned on the satellite view in Google maps, but satellites do much more than provide a birds-eye view of the Earth. Scientists and Engineers use them to capture data on a wide variety of topics. They provide information and knowledge on the state of the environment and progress in engineering projects.

The talk provided an introduction to Earth Observation and what it can do, followed by examples of its application to geoscience challenges, from mapping and anticipating landslides to understanding the impacts of deep coal mining on the environment. Beyond this, the use of EO to provide data on activities linked to societal concerns such as modern slavery was also explained. The talk was then followed by

a tour and demonstration of some of the research being carried out.

### Fake TV Licensing emails

Action Fraud has received more than 5,000 reports about fake emails and texts purporting to be from TV Licensing. The messages contain links to genuine-looking websites that are designed to steal personal and financial information. Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information in case it's a scam. Never automatically click on a link in an unexpected email or text. ## Warning of a Bogus Police Officer Fraud where fraudster claims he can be verified

Nottinghamshire Police have issued the following warning:-

“We continue to receive reports in Nottinghamshire where people have been targeted by someone pretending to be a police officer. They normally tell the victim that they’re investigating some fraudulent activity on their bank account and then ask them to provide some bank details. They sometimes trick the victim into verifying they are legitimate by calling them back on 999, when they in fact remain on the line the entire time.

A real police officer would NEVER call a member of the public asking them to disclose personal or financial information and then instruct them to take immediate financial action. *(Continued on next page >>>)*  
If you receive a call you’re not sure about it, always insist on verifying the callers identity. If you’re calling them back, use a number known to be connected to the organisation in question, not the one provided by the caller. For the police, it’s 101 and make sure you insist on talking to the named officer. Make this call from a separate telephone line to the one that the call was received if you can. If you don’t have one, wait at least 10 minutes before calling on the same line. Legitimate organisations will understand you wanting to make these steps and will not take issue with it.

## Action Fraud - HM Revenue and Customs Alert

### What you need to know

Action Fraud has experienced an increase in the reporting of malicious calls, voicemails, text messages or emails to members of the public purporting to be from HMRC. The fraudsters state that as a result of their non-payment of tax or other duty, the victim is liable to prosecution or other legal proceedings such as repossession of belongings to settle the balance but can avoid this by arranging for payment to be made immediately by method such as bank transfer or by iTunes gift cards.

If the victim is hesitant or refuses to comply, the suspect makes a threat such as immediate arrest, bailiffs or in cases where the victim appears to be of overseas origin; deportation. Often, the period for which the tax is allegedly due is distant enough to guarantee the victim will have little, if any, paperwork or ability to verify the claims. Once the money is paid the suspects sever all contact. It is vital that the public exercise caution when receiving messages or telephone calls of this nature.

### What you need to do

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information. Just because someone knows your basic details (such as your name and contact details), it doesn't mean they are genuine. Instead, contact the company directly using trusted methods such as a known email address or phone number.

Listen to your instincts. If something feels wrong then it is usually right to question it. No genuine organisation will ask you to pay taxes, bills or fees using iTunes Gift Cards, or any other type of voucher. Don’t be rushed or pressured into making a decision. Under no circumstances would a genuine bank or some other trusted organisation force you to make a financial transaction on the spot.

Report Phishing attempts. If you receive a call, text or email of this nature and have not lost money, report this as a phishing attempt to Action Fraud.

## Report on GBC Seniors Council Meetings & Activities September - December 2018

The reports submitted to Newslines on the meetings and activities of Gedling Borough Council’s Seniors Council complement the formal minutes of meetings sent to the BJU3A committee. Seniors Council meetings do not always coincide with the timeframe for submissions to Newslines hence on the present occasion a composite report covering the meetings in September and December 2018.

The aim of the September 2018 meeting had been to prepare members for an AGM in December. In the event, the meeting went “off-agenda” as some of those present took advantage of the unannounced appearance of local councillors to lobby for their individual concerns. It had been hoped to encourage members to put themselves forward for election to an embryonic committee; instead, this had to be left until the December meeting.

Rather than the formal AGM envisaged, the December 2018 meeting was convened as a general meeting of members, with a social component, as well as with a view to forming a steering group to take the Seniors Council forward to an AGM in April 2019. The Seniors Council was launched in March 2017 under the aegis of Gedling Borough Council, with draft terms of reference and with the remit of becoming independently constituted after two years.

The December 2018 meeting focused on the main activities and outcomes since March 2017, all aimed at combating loneliness and isolation among older residents in the borough and including:

- the nomination of a Chair and subsequent election of a vice-chair to work with GBC’s community development officer on the overall direction of the Seniors Council;
- the distinction between full members and associate members, the latter representing agencies and service providers, the former the older residents of the borough for whom the Seniors Council was set up;
- encouraging all members to take an active part in determining the content and format of meetings;
- links with the GBC Youth Council, with a major intergenerational event planned for March 2019;
- working with agencies and providers to disseminate relevant information among members and the wider community;
- since February 2018, initial work on compiling a directory of the facilities and amenities available for and accessible to older residents in the borough;
- in April 2018, the setting up of SPRING, a comprehensive social prescribing project jointly funded by Gedling Borough Council and Gedling Homes.

The December 2018 meeting was successful in involving all those present in a lively workshop on ageing, on its associated advantages and disadvantages, as well as specifically on ageing in Gedling borough. While accepting that funding will continue to be a major impediment to improvements, members identified the aspects of most concern, drawing up a list of themes and of outside agencies to be invited to future meetings.

Potential members of a steering group for the Seniors Council came forward at the December 2018 meeting, reflecting the diversity among residents of the borough of Gedling and aiming to ensure that the future committee would be representative of the membership as a whole.
