

#### **HISTORY**

The History Group meeting in May was a talk given by Jan Potter on the survivors of the Titanic disaster in 1912 when over 1500 people died and just over 700 were rescued. The talk covered the problems faced by survivors in the days before post traumatic stress disorder and survivor guilt syndrome were recognised. Some came to terms with what they had experienced and went on to lead fulfilling lives, whilst others suffered mental health problems for the rest of their lives, ten of the survivors committing suicide.

The talk also explained how the first film based on the disaster was released the month following the event, and the extraordinary life of the leading actress who was herself a survivor. Some of the other survivors focused on were a leading fashion designer who was sued by a very young Norman Hartnell, a honeymoon couple belonging to one of the richest families in America, and the hate campaign directed against the Managing Director of the White Star line, who many believed should have gone down with the ship. There were few happy endings! However the impact of the tragedy and some disclosures at the later enquiry led to the introduction of many of the safety regulations for passenger liners which are still observed today.

# GARDENING TYNTESFIELD

We were met by Head Gardener Paul who had been to talk to us some time ago about his work with the National Trust at Tredegar House.

After a quick coffee in the Cowshed (no cows), when we had what was luckily the only rain of the day, Paul shot off up the hill to the Arboretum. He could have planted a tree by the time we caught up!

There was a spectacular collection of trees, many of them rare specimens brought from all over the world and propagated at Tyntesfield.


Paul then took us to the Rose Garden, more recently created under his direction. As many old varieties only flower once in a season the roses had been thoughtfully interplanted with a variety of perennials, chosen for colour and interest as well as for attracting pollinators.

Finally we were shown the Orangery and kitchen gardens. The National Trust recruits volunteers to help its team of regular gardeners. We would have volunteered to pick some ripe apricots and peaches but were not required.

There was time for a coffee in the sunshine before making our way back up the hill to the bus.

On the way home we had a couple of hours at the Cadbury Garden Centre. We had time for a late lunch (both food and service excellent) and shopping. A lovely day out, thank you everyone!

# PUMPKIN MUFFINS

Ingredients:

1 Egg

125ml Milk

125ml mashed cooked or tinned Pumpkin

55g butter melted 189g Plain flour

100g Sugar

2 tsp Baking Powder

½ tsp Salt

½ tsp Cinnamon ½ tsp Nutmeg

100g Raisins

- 1. Heat oven to 400°.
- 2. Grease bottom of Muffin cups or use paper cups
- 3. Beat Egg slightly with fork
- 4. Stir in Milk, Pumpkin and Butter
- 5. Blend dry ingredients and stir in just until flour is moistened
- 6. Batter should be lumpy, fold in Raisins
- 7. Fill Muffin cups ¾
- 8. Sprinkle sugar over each Muffin
- 9. Bake 18 to 20 minutes.








#### WALKING GROUP
