At the start of a busy month with our AGM on 21st March (do not forget to fill in your Ballot form) and year end reports etc, we look forward to another successful year.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Analysis of the 2023/2024 accounts has been relatively easy because our financial situation has remained stable.

Our Income source remains the same year on year because we are solely dependant upon members Annual Subscriptions of £10 for a Full Member and £5 for an Associate Member. That calculates to an average income of nearly £4000 per annum. Aligned with that income source we have made substantial savings on the number of members who register for the Third Age Matters Magazine. Also, our monthly Coffee Mornings have proved to be not only socially, but also financially successful.

Furthermore we have managed to maintain reserves of £3000 that will ensure that we are able to function as a u3a in 2025/2026.

Unfortunately we have not progressed with our application for more income via Gift Aid because there is currently an ongoing issue between the Third Age Trust and Charity Commission on what we and other u3a's can claim. Expenditure has similarly followed the patterns of last year and we have spent your money on the following:

Our annual payment to the Third Age Trust of £1300.

Quarterly costs for the printing and publication of our Newsletter and other information for our members.

Costs for Hall hire to hold meetings and events and the cost of food and entertainment on those days.

The yearly accounts will be made available for the A.G.M. 0n 21st March, 2024.

Congratulations should go to Convenors and Group Treasurers. Here, although not officially part of my remit, there is also good news regarding the financial situation of our Interest Groups. All of whom appear to have good membership numbers and healthy income sources despite an increase in Hall hire charges. My personal thanks also go to a very hardworking committee and especially to John Mills and Paul Bennett for their help with the more difficult aspects of the Treasurer's role in 2023/2024.

Finally as a committee we are aware that we need to spend our members money wisely and our objectives for the future are focussed toward ensuring that we provide a variety of social and educational opportunities for everyone in 2024/2025. **Rob Harry**

WHY DOES BRITISH SUMMER TIME BEGIN SO LATE?

Hi everybody, you may remember putting the clocks back on Sun 29th October 2023, but what you probably did not know was that sunset was 17.43 (quarter to six in the evening) making sunset the following day Sunday and hour earlier at 16.41 (quarter to five in the evening).

Looking at sunset times for this year 2024, the sun sets again at 16.41 on January 28th, which if we put the clocks forward on this date would be exactly the same time as it was before we put the clocks back last year, on Sun 29th October. This would result in an extra hour of light evenings for us all, saving energy.

Currently the clocks went back on the 29th October, 53 days before the shortest day, (21st December 2023). Adding 53 days from the shortest day now would bring us, this year to Thursday 25th February, when sunset is recorded as 17.14. Moving the clocks forward during this week (25th February) would give lighter evenings up to 18.14 (quarter past 6).

So why oh why do we have to wait till 31st March 2024, for British Summer Time to begin, when sunset is 18.31, making it half past seven when the hour is added.

Think of all the daylight and gardening hours lost, not counting the energy wasted, from now until the end of March.



AIR FRYER SALMON

William Marshal (talk by John Burrows)

William Marshal is associated with Chepstow, Pembroke and Ireland, though 'Chepstow' was known as 'Striguil' in the 11th century, the time of William Marshal, and appears in the Domesday Book under that name. 'Striguil' lay within the Hundred of Caldicot.

A few facts about Chepstow are relevant to the background of the town. The tides are an important feature of Chepstow's geography, having an average difference between high and low tide of 11 metres (or approximately 36 feet); this made Chepstow a major port in the area during the medieval ages.

Chepstow Castle was probably the town's oldest building, constructed in 1067AD to guard the bridge crossing the River Wye,

William FitzOsbern was the first Earl of Hereford, and the original part of the castle was built by him. Sadly his estates were confiscated when he was implicated in a plot against the king, and the estates awarded to William Marshal.

William Marshal was a trusted adviser to four kings – Henry II, Richard I, John and Henry III. As well as his association with the rulers of England, he married Isabel de Clare, Countess of Striguil, Pembroke, and Clare, Ireland. William thus became lord of these estates by marriage.

Marshal was born in 1146 in Hampshire, southern England, and from age 13 to 19 he trained as a knight in northern France, and from 20 to 42-year old he toured the French tournament circuit. He was very skilled in the use of weapons – the aim of these mock battles was not *kill* an opponent, but to capture them and demand a ransom for return of their menfolk. He was very successful and became extremely wealthy.

Isabel de Clare was a ward of the king and a 'valuable asset', since her inherited wealth made her an attractive marriage prospect. in her teens she was the richest ward of the king, first Henry II, and then Richard I. William Marshal gained her hand in marriage sanctioned by the king. The custom in those days was that a woman's property was transferred to her husband when she married.

Marshal promptly travelled to the Tower of London, and claimed Isabel de Clare as his bride. Their courtship was short, but the marriage was apparently a success, lasting some thirty years.

When William Marshal was no longer the hero of the joust, he became an elder statesman and diplomat, travelling over much of England and Europe. Finally he was made regent for the youthful King Henry III.

Marshal's last venture on the battlefield was the Battle of Lincoln in 1217, when he repulsed a French army led by King Louis XII.

Marshal died in 1219 at Caversham Manor, near Reading, and later buried at the Temple Church in the City of London. Isabel de Clare died a year later, and was buried at Tintern Abbey.

The title 'Earl Marshal' is still in use today, and is conferred on people entrusted with the organisation of state occasions such as coronations, lying in state of monarchs, opening of Parliament, etc. The first person to organize these functions was William Marshal, and subsequent holders of the office have been appointed for their lifetime. The order of precedence for state and other important occasions is decided by the Earl Marshal. For example at the Westminster Abbey service of the late queen, the President of the United States of America was sat fourteen rows back from the front; some might think that the US President should have a more prestigious seat, but he was given one by the Earl Marshal, based on long established rules.

When William Marshal was made 'Earl Marshal', he was the one who seized the right from the other barons to exercise all these powers himself, to run the Accession Council, to run the coronations, to run the state funerals, especially as most other courtiers did not want the responsibility of the office. Most statues of William Marshal show him holding a copy of the Magna Carter, considered to be his greatest achievement. **Dave Edwards**
