Philosophy

This month the discussion was Plato on Erotic Love by philosopher Angie Hobbs.

Aristophanes gives us an inventive comic fantasy about three different sexes of proto human beings, male, female and hermaphrodite (both male and female) these beings were initially spherical, four arms, four legs, two heads, two faces and two sets of genitalia, they rolled around the surfaces of the earth like acrobats. This race got very uppity, they got above themselves, the Greek gods led by Zeus, wondered what to do about them, they couldn't kill them or they would loose all the libations and sacrifices. So they thought we will cut them in half. This will weaken them, but also double the number of libations. So Zeus ordered Hephaestus the blacksmith god, to cut them in half to form creatures with two arms, two legs, one face etc. these creatures moped around the world looking for their lost other half. Aristophanes says, this is what Eros is, it is the search for our other half. I'm sure we can all relate to that, even though it's a pretty strange analogy. Art Appreciation

Our November meeting was the last before the Christmas break and a good number of our group attended. The subject was A History of Portrait painting and looked at the art of portraiture from over 5,000 years ago until the present day. A short guiz started the talk, with members proving their knowledge by naming both the artist and the sitter from the 6 paintings shown. Although few examples remain from the oldest artistic traditions, 28 statues of Gudea, representative of a powerful ruler in 2090BC in ancient Egypt, are some of the earliest known portraits, later examples included the frescos of Pompeii, faces painted on linen wrappings on Mummy cases and coins depicting Roman emperors. Self-portraits both by male and female artists came to the fore in 16th century and beyond, Rembrandt, Gainsborough, Lenkiewicz, Vincent Van Gogh and Paul Gauguin being amongst those discussed. A huge change in portraiture came with the advent of the post impressionists notably with Matisse and Picasso playing with colour, line and form. In the 1960's technology was used in the art form with Andy Warhol introducing stamps, stencils and silkscreen into his work. Who could forget the silkscreen on linen of Marilyn Monroe which fetched the princely sum of \$4,450,500 dollars. Finally, into the 20th century, Hockney using only his I pad, made work executed entirely with the app Brushstrokes. But undoubtedly, the most widely practiced portrait art of today is the selfie, and we saw several examples of these from the rich and famous to the ordinary man on the street, including one by a very technically gifted monkey called Naturo. Portraiture is all about identity and that is something that we all share, thus it will never cease to command attention from all walks of life. Our next meeting will be on the 15th January and we would welcome new members to come and explore this fascinating subject.
