Philosophy

We read the last chapter in our Nigel Warburton's Philosophy Bites series. We discussed Atheism by A. C Grayling a prolific writer and academic. Topics like the rationality of belief, bad design in the universe, in science: the right concepts, the right procedures, and the right instruments. Ethics: rewarder and punisher. Is death final? Those who think for themselves. And so on. But he did say, he was fond of pointing out to people that the average human life is less than 1000 months long, which is a good reason for not wasting time if one can help it. It means that the things that you want to achieve must be achieved here. You must work: 'work while you have light' as the nineteenth century Swiss philosopher Henri-Frederic Amiel said. In the end you will survive in the way science tells us, which is that our constituents return to the elements, and become part of nature and remain permanently part of nature, we're not going to disappear entirely in the form of bits that we are made of. We also discussed the many millions of people around the world that believe in God or god's that find comfort and solace in this. The phenomenon of belief was not always or wholly bad, he says, but there was, on balance more negative than positive, with tremendous conflict and oppression. Great creativeness and beauty can be attributed to religion also. It's a subject that will go on for many of us. We have enjoyed going through this book. We have learned a great deal about how we view life and the things we take for granted. How we deeply related to some subjects, and laughed a lot. Starting with Yuk moving through relativism, friendship, discrimination, tolerance ohhh yes and infinity. Grasping the concepts of scientific realism, mind and body, vagueness, and of course wine! Ohhh and the paradox of tragedy!. The meaning of life and problem of evil we struggled through! Most of them so deep we could only skim the surface. Our next book is Philosophy Bites Back which adds the classic philosophers into the mix ie. Art Appreciation

The subject up for discussion was Bridget Riley, who at 92, is one of the oldest living, working painters of our time. Her name might not be instantly recognisable, but her art certainly is, as she became an icon, not just of Op art (a label she quietly disagreed with) but of contemporary British painting in the 1960's. During the war years, she and her family were evacuated to Cornwall near to the coast, which is where she drew her inspiration from nature. Bridget Riley's geometric paintings implore the viewer to reflect on how it physically



feels to look, and her paintings exploited optical illusions to make the two-dimensional surface of the painting seem to move, vibrate, and sparkle. She was inspired by Seurat and his exploration of colour, something which science was beginning to have a great effect upon during his time. Her work inspired textile designs and psychedelic posters over the decades, but her objectives have always been to interrogate what and how we see, and to provoke both uncertainty and clarity with her paintings. In 1967 she began to use pure colour and produced a permanent painting for the National Gallery called Messengers, a great achievement for any artist. The title comes from a phrase John Constable used when referring to clouds in the sky. Next month, in something of a coincidental prequel, we will be looking at the work of Georges Seurat.
