Allsorts Trip to the British Schools Museum Hitchin and nearby Lavender Farm Thursday, 8th June



The above trip has a few spaces available for the wider C&D u3a membership.

Hitchin holds a unique place in the history of education as it boasts the world's last remaining purpose-built Monitorial schoolroom. The grade II * listed building opened in 1837, but the school was founded in 1810, a full 80 years before the government finally provided free elementary education for all.

It's £10 per person and this includes refreshments (tea/coffee and biscuits) on arrival and the private visit includes the history of the school/education, a Victorian lesson, classrooms set in the WW1 and WW2 periods to see and then the Head Masters House.

Travel is by car with sharing where possible.

The exhibition, titled 'Art and Design', had works by some of these artists, including Edward Bawden and his son Richard; Eric Ravilious and others from the same period. There was also something by Grayson Perry.

The small room had works by a contemporary textile artist. We hope to visit again next year when the exhibition will display different items from the collection.
