Zero Charges for Courses from September 2020 to June 2021

The committee recognise that due to Covid-19 we have been severely restricted in what courses and events we can offer for the membership subscription. However, we have been successful in obtaining over £3,000 from HMRC in Gift Aid and as a result we are able to make all courses free of charge in the above period, irrespective of whether they are by Zoom or in halls. During this period all courses will be offered on a first-come-first-served basis as this will reduce the administration required. We will not be able to run any face-to-face courses between January and March 2021 and will regularly review this situation as the Covid-19 Guidance is updated by Government.

In addition, the membership subscription will be held at £20 per person for 2021/22. We hope this will encourage everyone to renew when they receive the renewal letter in January 2021. However, we will have to revert to charging fees for courses in the Main Programme when it starts in September 2021.

Fresh Apple Cake

Apples are in abundance this month and this is a very simple recipe that I find foolproof. It is delicious served with cream.

1lb diced fresh apples (do not peel)

4oz sugar

Mix thoroughly and add

4 fl oz cooking oil

2 well beaten eggs

1 tsp vanilla essence

Mix and add

8oz SR flour

2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp cinnamon

½ tsp salt

Put in greased dish* and bake at 160°C (325°F) if glass dish OR 180°C (350°) if tin Bake for 1 hour or until cake shrinks from sides.

*Use $9'' \times 6'' \times 2''$ deep, rectangular glass Pyrex dish.

Serve cold with cream.
