SHIPS, DISASTERS AND STORIES OF CANVEY'S MARITIME PAST

A talk by Rod Bishop and Graham Turner

Firstly, apologies for deafening everyone with the feedback from the microphone. As usual, we set it all up and checked it was all working before you came in, so we don't know why there was suddenly an issue. Gremlins?

Anyway, we welcomed Rod Bishop and Graham Turner, past veterans of our Local History Group talks before Covid (B.C.?), and many us have fond memories of the wallpaper scroll, before they became more hi-tech. They started with a familiar sight of Essex barges, a painting by Harry Russell of Stacky, one of the barges, off Thorney Bay. There were once over 100, and they were used in this case to take hay to London for all the horses at work on the street. They had a crew of two only.

We then told about a series of disasters, mainly collisions. I can appreciate it can be quite tricky in fog and the shipping channel isn't that wide, but I was surprised at the number. Ben Mohr in 1902, on a foggy day, was bringing 1500 tons of cement in barrels, when it was hit by SS Banffshire, a cargo ship. The skipper of the Ben Mohr ran it aground on Thorney Bay to clear the channel. The cement turned solid in the barrels and was salvaged by Hester (Winter Gardens, monorail fame). It was used as foundations for Beach House and Marlborough House, and the barrels can still be seen around the island, mainly as decorative features.

In 1924, the Matatua was involved in a collision with another ship, witnessed by Harry Russell. This was off Hole Haven. The Matatua was collecting explosives made in this area. (Wat Tyler Country Park is the site of an explosives factory as an example. Flat area by river, not many inhabitants in case it goes up). Although 8 of the crew were lost, the ship was salvaged and returned to service. In 1945 MV Erinna had 8000 tons of petrol from Shell Haven, when yet another collision led to a broken tank and fuel burning in the sea. Fire tenders were stationed at the Lobster Smack jetty (war time). A complicated laying out of pipes led to a bravery award, the fire was put out and the boat towed to safety. In 1948 the Skum (Norwegian) was listing and spilling its timber cargo load. However, this may have occurred off Harwich as a passenger liner rescued 20 of the crew, so the timbers around Canvey shores may be nothing to do with the Skum, which was involved in many North Sea convoys, and was regularly at Southend.





A happier story was when the new Royal Yacht Britannia sailed past Canvey in 1954 towards the end of the new gueen's tour of the Empire and Commonwealth, though most of the tour was on a refurbished ship, the Gothic, used by George VI, and used on this tour as far as Aden, as the new yacht wasn't ready.

The gas, petrol and other plants and their jetties have inevitably been the scenes of some accidents, potentially very dangerous of course. Liquified Natural Gas (kept at -162 degrees C, or similar temperature on the moors pitches we had to play rugby on in Sheffield at school! Another talk in itself!) arrived on Canvey in 1959, with a pipeline to Rochford. We saw a picture of the Methane Princess in 1964, originally bringing LNG from Algeria, and by then the pipeline had been extended to Leeds. Eventually North Sea Gas, really natural gas, replaced the original town gas (coal gas). In 1970, disaster struck with Monte Ulia going straight through the Mobil jetty number 4 as a tanker was discharging oil. A massive fire followed and spread to two barges, thought to be London rubbish barges, but actually carrying petrol. Firemen rowed out to the barges with extinguishers to help put the fires out, and more commendations rightly ensued. In 1982, the Jemrix collided with the concrete and steel methane jetty going right through it with minimal damage to the ship. However, this wrecked the offloading facilities, out of action for 18 months, and the business moved permanently to Le Havre. 32 new ships for carrying the various fuels in liquid form were commissioned off Canvey, and went up to 32,000 tons, though modern ones are 90,000 tons, which is a lot of gas in liquid form. Obviously the storage of fuel and gas (Calor) continues to this day, with plans to extend the Oikos fuel terminal leading to much debate.

Certainly, I knew very little about Canvey's maritime history and I suspect I was not alone, as Rod and Graham took us on a journey through it. Paul.

Canasta – what on earth is Canasta? Isn't it the Spanish word for basket? Is it a card game? Is it easy to learn and fun to play?

Perhaps as you flicked through the pages of the monthly newsletter or as you noticed the group information slips on Linda's desk at the monthly meeting, a passing thought may have been "I wonder what Canasta is"? What is Canasta?

To score points players in each team together attempt to make canastas. A canasta is a group of seven cards of the same numerical rank. A team "goes out" by one of the team playing all the cards in his hand. The points are then counted and a new game begins again until one team reaches 5000 points.

Then you may have asked yourself.

- If I am interested in joining this group, is the group a friendly one?
- Do they welcome new group members with open arms?
- Do they help new group members learn the game?
- Does that help continue until the new member is comfortable with the game?
- Would it be a way of pleasantly passing an afternoon, learning new card skills with a group of friendly group members, some of whom I may currently know, or other members I will get to know and become friends with?
- Will playing help keep my brain active with a gentle workout?
- Does the alternate Tuesdays and Wednesdays timetable fit in my schedule without a commitment?
- Do the playing times of 2pm to 5pm suit me?
- Would I be able to play just occasionally if other commitments crop up?
- Does playing in the Morrison's community room have its attractions because it's free and convenient to pick up some shopping before or after the game?

On the other hand, if you have played Canasta in the past, you may be thinking whether you would enjoy getting reacquainted with the game. Perhaps you play occasionally with other non-u3a groups already and you may be thinking it would be good to meet and play with new players. You probably then are asking yourself the same questions a member with no Canasta knowledge has.

Well, there is just one answer to those questions and that answer is YES.

So why not join our friendly group and enjoy a relaxing game of cards in great company while keeping your mind active and giving your brain a gentle workout at the same time.






