GOOD KING HAL

A talk by Michael Farley

We welcomed Michael Farley to our Friday meeting, suitably attired as a jolly Good King Hal, and were royally entertained on the life and loves of Henry VIII.



We discovered the royal descent of Henry VIII was through the second marriage of Catherine de Valois, ex-wife of Henry VI to a commoner and sergeant at arms, Owen Tudor. One of their children, Edmund Tudor, was made Duke of Richmond, followed by his son, Henry Tudor, the future Henry VII and father of Henry VIII. Henry Tudor was the victor at the final battle of the Wars of the Roses at Bosworth in Leicestershire, where the Yorkist Richard III (hump back invented by Shakespeare as Tudor propaganda) was defeated and killed and hastily buried, to be found later under a car park. Henry VII restored peace to the land by marrying Elizabeth of York, uniting the Houses of York and Lancaster.

Henry and Elizabeth soon produced a vital son and heir, Arthur, who was betrothed to a Spanish princess, Catherine of Aragon, Spain being then the most important country in Europe. Alas, he spoilt the best laid plans by dying aged 15, possibly after swimming in sewage-affected water. Luckily, there was a second son, Henry, once destined for the church (the church had a lucky escape), and now to be the next king and also to marry Catherine of Aragon.

Henry became king in 1509, a young man of 18 with his wife 5 years older. Soon they fulfilled their main duty and had a son, Henry, who unfortunately died. Catherine was beset by miscarriages and still births, only producing one daughter, Mary, in 1516. As we neared the end of the 1520s, and with no heir in sight, Henry was getting desperate. His advisers came up with a cunning plan and found a bit of Leviticus that said it was a sin to marry your brother's wife (though the passage clearly suggests the brother had to still be alive and married to her.) Armed with this gem, Cardinal Wolsey was despatched to Rome to get the pope's permission for a divorce. Normally, popes would oblige kings, but the pope was held captive by Catherin's nephew, Charles V, Holy Roman Emperor, King of Spain and half of Europe. Failure cost Wolsey his position, though he luckily died before Henry could charge him with treason.

The next plan involved Henry declaring himself Supreme Head of the Church in England and Defender of the Faith, still on British coins today. This allowed Henry to divorce Catherine, treat her badly and send her to a nunnery to end her days. It also allowed Henry to marry......Steve (you had to be at the talk)...the very pregnant Anne Boleyn. An aside, the Boleyns came from Rochford Hall, now incorporated into the club house of the golf course there. Anne was never popular, somewhat stroppy, not well born, and also had several miscarriages. At this point, you are thinking it must be Henry as the common denominator, but you can imagine he was having none of that, not that anyone would dare suggest it. She did have a daughter, Elizabeth, in 1533. (Wolf Hall, which many of you will have seen is about these events). The opponents of Anne soon convinced Henry she was a witch and adulteress, confessions were extracted by torture, including from her own brother, and Anne got the chop with a sword at the rehearsal. (Of noble birth were always beheaded by axe or sword, commoners hanged and left to die slowly, traitors hung, drawn and quartered.)

Henry had eyes on Jane Seymour, who he married 24 hours later and she produced the beloved son, Edward, though Jane died 12 days later of septicaemia. Henry was genuinely upset, and when he died, he insisted he was buried with her. All royal family portraits showed Henry, Jane and the 3 children long after she died. Henry's sorrow lasted 3 years, and then Thomas Cromwell persuaded him a new match and alliance would be beneficial. Henry by now was old and fat, so not much of a catch and not capable of travelling Europe looking for a bride. The royal painter Holbein, was sent to paint suitable ladies, though Christina of Denmark said no. Holbein returned with the pictures. I have visions of Henry looking over them, drooling, with the odd cor, no way etc. Anne of Cleves was selected. Henry rushed to meet her in Rochester and was somewhat unimpressed by his "Flanders Mare". I suspect her lack of English was one aspect of the problems. The marriage occurred, Cromwell got the chop (probably next series of Wolf Hall), Anne was divorced, looked after well and lived longer than any of his wives. (Another aside, one of the properties she was given was in Rayleigh/Hockley area).

At this point, you think Henry would have called it a day. He is fat and old and riddled with illness. I am surprised we weren't told about them, but gout and a septic ulcer were two of them. The Duke of Norfolk had other ideas and saw a way to become even more favoured at court. He persuaded one of the Howard clan, Katherine, to marry Henry. At 17, this can only end badly, especially as Katherine kept her male "admirers". More torture, more executions, including Katherine, not yet 20.

By now Henry needed a nursemaid as much as a wife. Katherine Parr, twice married and engaged to Thomas Seymour, was chosen with Thomas despatched to foreign embassy duties. (After Henry's death, she did marry Thomas, but she died in childbirth.) Katherine insisted on two days prayer to think about it. Katherine nursed Henry well, but he finally succumbed to all his illnesses in January, 1547, in Whitehall.

The whole talk was full of jokes, a few even being clean, but Michael then told us about the children he met who had done projects on the Tudors. I liked the one about Walter Raleigh circumcising the globe with his 200 feet clipper, and the boy who called the cod piece a cockpit! The amusing stories about the WI included him being booked as a last minute replacement for a speaker, the ladies weren't impressed and he was the anti-climax. I am sure you can remember the rest of the joke.

Michael, in his kingly regalia, gave a splendid performance (much more than a talk) with jokes that made us laugh and a delivery style that we will long remember. Paul.

CANASTA

AND PERHAPS WHY YOU SHOULD THINK OF JOINING THE GROUP

Canasta - what on earth is Canasta? Isn't it the Spanish word for basket? Is it a card game? Is it easy to learn and fun to play?

Perhaps as you flicked through the pages of the monthly newsletter or as you noticed the group information slips on Linda's desk at the monthly meeting, a passing thought may have been "I wonder what Canasta is"? Then you have flicked the page over or continued on passed the table and dismissed the thought of Canasta and joining the Canasta group.

Or, perhaps you lingered a while on that page or paused to look at the Canasta Group information sign and thought of finding out a bit more about the game and the group.

What is Canasta?

Canasta is an easy to learn card game, which is played by four or 6 players in two teams with two standard decks of cards and wild cards. Each card has a score value and the object of the game is for each team to score points and one team to reach 5000 points before the opposing team.

To score points players in each team together attempt to make canastas. A canasta is a group of seven cards of the same numerical rank. A team "goes out" by one of the team playing all the cards in his hand. The points are then counted and a new game begins again until one team reaches 5000

Then you may have asked yourself.

- If I am interested in joining this group, is the group a friendly one?
- Do they welcome new group members with open arms?
- Do they help new group members learn the game?
- Does that help continue until the new member is comfortable with the game?
- Would it be a way of pleasantly passing an afternoon, learning new card skills with a group of friendly group members, some of whom I may currently know, prother members I will get to know and become friends with?
- Will playing help keep my brain active with a gentle workout?
- Does the alternate Tuesdays and Wednesdays timetable fit in my schedule without a commitment?
- Do the playing times of 2pm to 5pm suit me?
- Would I be able to play just occasionally if other commitments crop up?
- Does playing in the Morrison's community room have its attractions because it's free and convenient to pick up some shopping before or after the game?

On the other hand, if you have played Canasta in the past, you may be thinking whether you would enjoy getting reacquainted with the game. Perhaps you play occasionally with other non-u3a groups already and you may be thinking it would be good to meet and play with new players. You probably then are asking yourself the same questions a member with no Canasta knowledge has.

Well, there is just one answer to those questions and that answer is YES.

So why not join our friendly group and enjoy a relaxing game of cards in great company while keeping your mind active and giving your brain a gentle workout at the same time.

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


