A WHIP and a WAND

Paul reports on a talk by Rebecca Harris MP

We welcomed back our MP, Rebecca Harris to speak to our Friday meeting. She reminded us of her role as a whip, now with the marvellous title of Comptroller of the Royal Household, after previously being Lord Commissioner of the Treasury. She brought her red box in and explained the whip's role was to ensure Commons business ran smoothly, the correct ministers were in place for questions, MPs were there for key debates and votes, and to look after and check up on her group of 26, mainly male grandees. Her new whip title dates to 1399, and Rebecca is the first female to hold the title. She equated her role, in football terms, as manager/groundsman with the speaker as the referee. As one of her roles is to ensure the correct minister is there to speak, and if he or she isn't there, she must speak on their behalf, getting the right person there is essential. During a major terrorist security alert, when the Commons was locked down, Rebecca was relieved that the minister had made it into the house before the lockdown. Rebecca has been a whip for 7 years but said she had no ministerial ambitions, and did not crave national media attention, as only the local media can interview her. So you will see Rebecca and other local MPs in the Echo (one in particular being in every day.....but I digress). When she was Lord Commissioner of the Treasury, signing off spending for the NHS, Education, etc was one of her duties, as two of the four had to sign each "cheque" off, her biggest being £387 billion. She also dealt with intestate deaths, where the estate goes to the crown.

In her new role as whip attached to the Royal Household, she has two colleagues, the Vice Chamberlain who tells the king what is going on in the Commons, and the Treasurer. As Comptroller, she has a wand, i.e. a wand of office, officially part of the crown jewels. She carries this at royal garden parties to stop the Royal Family being mobbed by keen fans before tea and sandwiches (I bet no crusts) as a reward. Rebecca then went on to 3 specific things she was involved in as Comptroller.

When the late Queen died, on Tuesday night, with the funeral on Saturday, Rebecca was told she had to attend in an email. (Keep checking your emails folks), She discovered there was a lot of marching and hadn't a clue what the dress protocol was. The answer, showing it was the usual male expectation, of morning suit or dress uniform wasn't very helpful, but it was decided day dress and hat were required. Rebecca decided what was worn at the last royal funeral wasn't much use, so went to Ede and Ravenscroft to access a suitable coat for a funeral. (You will be impressed, or probably not, that I too had an outfit from this illustrious outfitters, as they also do graduation gowns.)

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

Rebecca arrived at the Abbey first thing, suitably attired with wand. She discovered ' that she had missed the formal rehearsal, as no one had told her, but luckily the running order was in the programme. She was also not told that the procession was about to start and she had to find her correct place in it. She, thankfully, was behind an old duke, who knew how to march and avoid horse poo, though not before standing in one lot. She also discovered - and did anyone know this - that all the traffic lights can be pulled out of the ground to improve the vista. Rebecca managed the march to Buckingham Palace, where they were bussed to Windsor, where another march awaited. At least, in the chapel, she was able to remove her shoes for a cool on the cold stone floor.

A royal funeral is of course followed by a coronation. Again, Rebecca had to find out if she was needed and the organiser was the Earl Marshal, the Duke of Norfolk, the most senior noble family in England, notoriously Catholic - and one of the Dukes in the 16th century was executed. She went with one of the other whips to be kitted out in Norfolk (the county), and the Duke seemed happy with the picture of what they would wear. This time she did attend the rehearsal and found out the Royal Standard Bearer came from some obscure family in Lincolnshire and they had done it for years. At least the heralds had decent new uniforms, not the old tatty ones they had at the funeral. You will remember, the procession came in and had to go round a narrow bit of the abbey, and Rebecca was careful to make sure she didn't bash anything or anyone with her wand. We remember seeing her in the procession. She got good seats opposite the Royal Family with the household.

Her final appearance with wand was the official state opening of parliament. She even was in one of open carriages, the third one, complete with hot water bottle and well used blanket. One ancient ritual was that the Vice Chamberlain of the Household can't attend as the idea is the Vice Chamberlain stays in the palace as a hostage to ensure the King comes back alive, though I am struggling to remember a king killed off in a state opening before. Happily, the King returned and a tiny room was crowded with dignitaries (and Rebecca!) to enjoy English sparkling wine and posh canapes, hopefully not cheap sausage rolls from Iceland.

She did say she once met the late queen's husband, who actually knew where Castle Point was and greeted Rebecca with a suitably witty remark.

All told, another great talk from Rebecca and, as Diane said, very interesting to hear what really happened from an inside view of such events, as we only ever see the polished end-product on TV.







30th April: I will look at the origins of and historical reasons for the Doomsday Book, and what it tells us about our area in 1086.


28th May: Pam will do her talk on Pammie the first 10 years.


