### RECORDS BANNED BY THE BBC 1931 - 1957 A TALK BY ROSE GRIFFIN TWYDELL

We welcomed Rose, a fellow u3a member, to our September meeting to talk about some of the records banned by the BBC from 1931-1957 and to explain the reasoning behind the decision making which in many cases from a 2022 viewpoint seems rather amusing.

She started her talk by playing a record by Norman Long entitled "We Can't Let You Broadcast That." It was played in Music Halls making fun of the BBC with all its rules and regulations. However Norman Long had been a BBC broadcaster for five years but after this record was never to work for the corporation again.

In 1940 the government had realised the importance of radio as by then 80% of households owned one so it had warned the BBC to be careful what it was broadcasting especially with families being separated by war. It wanted an output of robust dance music such as from the Glenn Miller Orchestra which would boost morale around the world although even he had a record banned for being too similar to Tchaikovsky's 6th Symphony!

The BBC appointed a Dance Music Policy Committee to vet records to be suitable for play on the station. The criteria included no words of advertising in the songs or anything considered bad taste or smutty and some records were also checked by the head of religious broadcasting for being too slushy and fear of lowering the nations' morals.

We were then given the opportunity to listen to a number of records from these decades to decide why the committee had banned them from being broadcasted. They were often songs that had been very popular in the Music Halls or classic Blues Songs or music performed by very popular entertainers.



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

Canasta is an easy to learn card game which is played by four or 6 players in two teams with two standard decks of cards and wild cards. Each card has a score value and the object of the game is for each team to score points and one team to reach 5000 points before the opposing team.

To score points players in each team together attempt to make canastas. A canasta is a group of seven cards of the same numerical rank. A team "goes out" by one of the team playing all the cards in his hand. The points are then counted and a new game begins again until one team reaches 5000 points.

Then you may have asked yourself.

- > If I am interested in joining this group, is the group a friendly one?
- Do they welcome new group members with open arms?
- > Do they help new group members learn the game?
- with open arms? 1 the game? 1 the game?
- Does that help continue until the new member is comfortable with the game?
- Would it be a way of pleasantly passing an afternoon, learning new card skills with a group of friendly group members, some of whom I may currently know, or other members I will get to know and become friends with?
- Will playing help keep my brain active with a gentle workout?
- > Does the alternate Tuesdays and Wednesdays timetable fit in my schedule without a commitment?
- > Do the playing times of 2pm to 5pm suit me?
- > Would I be able to play just occasionally if other commitments crop up?
- Does playing in the Morrison's community room have its attractions because it's free and convenient to pick up some shopping before or after the game?

On the other hand, if you have played Canasta in the past, you may be thinking whether you would enjoy getting reacquainted with the game. Perhaps you play occasionally with other non-u3a groups already and you may be thinking it would be good to meet and play with new players. You probably then are asking yourself the same questions a member with no Canasta knowledge has.

## BOOST YOUR RETIREMENT INCOME WITH A STATE TOP-UP

Pension credit is a benefit aimed at retired people on low incomes and can be worth  $\pounds$ 1,000s a year. Plus, if you claim it you can access a whole raft of other benefits including council tax discounts and free TV licences for over-75s. However, about 800,000 eligible households don't claim – often because they don't know they can or that they need to. This guide tells you how to check if you qualify and how to claim.

It's a national tragedy that close to one million pensioners, many of whom have been paying into the system for years, are missing out on an average income boost of  $\pounds 3,300$ /year via pension credit. Here, we've a summary and quick links to get you started if you already know the basics.

- It takes minutes to check if you qualify, so don't stall, just call. The exact rules
  of who can get pension credit are complex, so we have a simple rule of
  thumb if you're of state pension age (66 or older) and have total weekly
  income under roughly £200, then <u>get online</u> or call the <u>pension credit
  helpline</u> to see if you're due.
- · Pension credit can be worth £65 a week on average.
- Pension credit has a superpower... it's also a gateway to FREE TV licences and MUCH MORE. Those who claim the main part of pension credit can get discounts on other bills such as a council tax reduction – worth about £1,000/year typically – and the warm home discount – worth £140/year.
- It's NOT automatic so you MUST claim here's how. You can <u>apply via</u> <u>Gov.uk</u> if you've already claimed your state pension, but otherwise you'll need to phone the Pension Service on 0800 99 1234 (or the Northern Ireland Pension Centre on 0808 100 6165). You can backdate it for three months, so the quicker you check, the quicker you'll benefit.

Over eight million households will get a one-off cash boost as part of the Government's new cost of living support package. If you hit state pension age on or before 25 May 2022, apply for pension credit by 24 August 2022 to get the full £650.



Mitsubishi had to change the name of its Pajero model in Spanish-speaking countries, where it means "wanker." (I checked the translation for this and its true!)


