London Discovery - Cathedrals Underground

On January 29th I organised a guided tour of the Jubilee Line extension led by John Morgan: aptly named Cathedrals Underground. We had to delay from the original date in early January due to strike action but I am glad to say there was minimal disruption on our new date.


We all met at 11.00 am at the Westminster underground station where John described the process of building a large hole in the ground while protecting large historic structures nearby including Big Ben. They have kept some of the original concrete pouring pipes on display across the roof structure.

We then went on, stopping at Southwark and Bermondsey, to admire and hear about their architecture. Although there was one overall architect for the project, individual architects contributed to the design of the stations: varying from the grand to the small. A circular maze pattern for you to work out is on display at every one of the underground stations as part of Transport for London's (TfL) Art on the Underground programme. (Originally commissioned to mark the London Underground's 150th anniversary in 2013, each of the 270 stations have their own unique labyrinth, numbered 1-270 according to its order in the route the contestants took in the 2009 Guinness World Record Tube Challenge. In 2023 a further two were added at Nine Elms and Battersea Power Station, but were numbered 110a and 110b as they branch off from Kennington Station, which is 110. The artist is Mark Wallinger. Ed)

Next stop was Canada Water where we were shown the ongoing project to develop the wetland habitats, including raising the water level and installing a new 170m long pedestrian boardwalk traversing the dock; new seating and steps along the southern edge leading down to the water. From here we went to Canary Wharf, which is an amazing station. Truly bigger than any cathedral I have seen. It has many exits, links with the DLR and is deep underground.

We ended the tour at North Greenwich, the home of the O2 dome, where we dispersed to take lunch in groups or make our way home. A magnificent 2-hour tour where we all learned a lot and appreciated these spaces which we normally just run through to catch a train. London Discovery Visit to Armourers' Hall

The visit to the Armourers' Hall proved very popular, with nearly 40 members applying to join the visit. Fortunately, the Livery Company were very helpful, and said that they could accommodate all of us! For once the trains behaved themselves, and so we had no travel problems.

I was a bit anxious taking such a large group, but it proved very easy. Everyone was on time, and the entire party started the visit with coffee and biscuits in the beautiful reception room. This was very welcome, as it was pouring with rain!

We were then treated to a wonderful presentation on the work of Livery Companies in general, the history of the Armourers' Company, and the hall itself. Our host, who was formerly the Clerk of the company (effectively the CEO) and who now organises visits, was excellent. The talk was also a history lesson, covering the history of armour, and a graphic account of the Battle of Agincourt.

We were then taken to the Livery Hall. This was spectacular, and is one of only two Livery Company halls where they still hold candlelight dinners!

The decorations and the paintings were amazing, as was the collection of armour. We learned about the scandalous mistress of one of the founders of the company, whose portrait hangs alongside the master. Apparently, she was not allowed to be buried with him as he requested, but at least her portrait hangs next to his!

Having been invited to write something about the contribution our outgoing group leader, Kate Nash, has made to the gardening group, it occurs to me that this is an opportunity to take a quick look back at the (at times chequered) history of the group. Over the years the baton has been passed from group leader to group leader, and various permutations of how "content" and learning, theoretical and practical, has been delivered.

Our u3a gardening group goes way back, but perhaps really started to take off with the arrival of Mike Brigden in 2010, and Roy Skelton, who was at the time chairman of the Caterham & District Horticultural Society. They were a great combination with Mike stepping up – as he so ably does! – as group leader, and Roy bringing gardening expertise, and many amusing yarns of his gardening days. We were told by Roy's wife Carol after Roy sadly and unexpectedly passed away that the group had meant a great deal to him. We certainly enjoyed Roy's stories!

Jim and Julia Spinks followed, and developed a format whereby willing members invited the group to their gardens, resulting in much sharing of ideas and experiences. It is interesting just how varied the gardens and indeed the terrain in the area is, and how much creativity and ingenuity goes in to gardening. We covered a great deal of ground (another bad pun, sorry) and good and ongoing friendships have been developed over a shared love of gardening. There has been – and continues to be – quite a lot of eating of cake!



Kate Nash gamely stepped up when we finally decided to allow Jim and Julia to "retire" as group leaders, although they continue as stalwart members of the group. Little did Kate, or indeed any of us, anticipate the arrival of the pandemic. This in September 2020 from Kate to the group brings it all back, and illustrates Kate's encouraging and inclusive leadership style and ability to hold the group together:

"Following on from the latest Government announcement this week, the u3a has come to the decision that no groups that meet in people's homes should meet for the foreseeable future. However, let's remain cheerful and positive and most of all keep in touch. Let us know what you are doing in your own garden or any gardens that you have visited. If you have any gardening questions, someone in our group will be able to answer them."

As of February 2024 it has been deemed, somewhat reluctantly on our part, that Kate has more than "served her time" and we respect her wishes to stand down. Under Kate the group has grown in size and range of activities, and continues to be friendly and welcoming to new members, and that will continue. No one has been persuaded to step forward as formal leader of the group (yet!), and so we are trying a new approach. We have a very interesting programme of monthly events for the rest of the year: the ideas being contributed by the group, and a volunteer organiser for each event – no arm twisting was required! Some are visits to external gardens, some are visits to members' gardens; there will be a talk by an expert on biodiversity hosted by the Downlands Trust, and a "Gardeners' Question Time" with two experts from the Caterham Horticultural Society. We will no doubt enjoy the visit to Mandy's garden where (she says) she will be

frantically growing flowers for her daughter's wedding. Communications on behalf of the organiser of each month's event will be sent out via Beacon, with Helen (me) brushing up my rather rusty Beacon skills with a slight feeling of trepidation.

Some last words from two long standing members of the group:

"Kate has been a very dynamic leader & has given a great deal of time to running the group, putting together visits & meetings to hold the interest of all & bringing enjoyment for everyone"

"Kate has been a great leader of the garden group and has worked hard organising the various monthly activities. 

We have a mix of novice, improver and experienced DIYers, with a good range of skills. Our activities are fairly varied, so there is always a good variety of interest and different aspects of DIY and crafting. Since the launch we have tackled quite a few projects, including:-

Repairing torn garden cushions, modifying, repairing and re-wiring a vintage lamp and renovating/re-polishing a table. We've made garden obelisks from roofing battens (6 completed over several sessions) and discussed home DIY queries, including how to drill into walls/hang shelves/pictures, etc. We've also had demonstrations on tool and

chisel sharpening, French polishing, electrical PAT testing and had a tutorial and demo of stained glass making and repair as well as providing basic tuition to beginners on sawing, drilling and fixing wood together with screws. In our last two sessions we made bird boxes and bug boxes: these 'making' sessions are very popular with most of the members.



Tuesday 3rd September Today we visit the pretty port of Honfleur on the Seine estuary, where we shall be free to explore, returning to the hotel in time for dinner.



Wednesday 4th September Mont-Saint-Michel is our destination today. With entry to the abbey included. We return to the hotel in time for dinner.

Thursday 5th September We start with a visit to Bayeux, with entry to the Bayeux Tapestry Museum included, then go on to the seaside resort of Arromanches-les-Bains, where we'll

have time to look around before returning to the hotel in time for dinner.

Friday 6th **September** There sill be time to explore Lisieux this morning before journeying to Calais for our ferry to Dover and onward to the Caterham area.

The total cost is £765 per person, with a single room supplement of £185. Woods require that everybody has insurance and can offer this at £64 per person if you don't already have your own travel insurance.

'The Dregs of the People Remain' - The Black Death and its aftermath - Imogen Corrigan



It is possible to see a shift in artistic tastes following the plague years which began in the mid fourteenth century. This is understandable considering that we now know that at least 50% (probably more) of the population of Europe and beyond perished in the first wave and that the disease recurred over the next 130 years. Naturally, there were social changes as people adjusted to this shocking change in their communities, but there was also an understandable and distinct increase in interest in the macabre. Reactions to this disaster can be seen all over parish churches; some in the form of explorations of what will happen in the next life and some surprisingly optimistic and amusing. We see more interest in expagan images and specific demands for spiritual protection and so what might be seen as a dust-to-dust mentality also becomes one of no tragedy, no triumph.

Friday 15 March - Europe at War: Putin's War in Ukraine & the British Commitment presented by Gordon



Corrigan MBE, FRAS In February 2022 the unthinkable happened: the Russian Federation invaded its neighbour Ukraine and so began the most intensive military conflagration in Europe since the Second World War. This study day looks at the background to this war and examines its effect on British military planning and policies.

Friday 19 April - Earth's Atmosphere: Our Life Support System presented by Professor David Phillips (Imperial College, London). This study day covers the development of the Earth's atmosphere over geological time and the impact of man on the atmosphere since the Industrial Revolution. The great London Smog, the Hole in the Ozone Layer and the recognition of Global Warming have all occurred in our lifetimes. Society has significantly tackled the first two challenges and now we face the third and greatest challenge.





Friday 17 May - The Jazz Age & Beyond with Howard Lawes, Grace Evans, Dave Allison & The Alleycats Jazz Band The novels of F. Scott Fitzgerald chronicled the hedonism and excitement of the Jazz Age in America – Fitzgerald once claimed that the 1920s were "the most expensive orgy in history". In Britain the growing interest in jazz music brought black and white musicians, artists and audiences together, and was crucial in influencing changes in British society, while in Europe, Ballets Russe, Hot Club de France, Art Deco and Bauhaus have left a lasting legacy in dance, music and design. The influence of jazz on society and society on jazz will be discussed with plenty of musical and visual illustrations.
