
Steven Devine combines a career as a conductor and director of orchestral, choral and opera repertoire with that of a solo harpsichordist and fortepianist. He is Conductor and Artistic Advisor of The English Haydn Festival; Music Director of New Chamber Opera, Oxford and Director of the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment's "Bach the Universe & Everything" series.

Opportunity to Track Your Health & Activity

Active Surrey — one of 43 Active Partnerships in the UK – is a not-for-profit organisation that promotes Physical Activity and movement to Surrey Residents. They believe that movement matters to our health, our schools & our environments.



Residents living in or near Merstham, Redhill, Camberley, Staines and Guildford Libraries can borrow for FREE a smart Health & Activity Tracker (smart watch) for up to 6 weeks. The trackers have a whole host of features including heart rate and stress levels,

activity and sleep and is meant to encourage a healthier lifestyle, helping you monitor daily activities. There's a PAI – personal activity intelligence metric which can help wearers manage their health status. Each library has 3– 4 trackers which are available to loan to adult members. If you're not a member, it's easy to join.

As part of the trial, there are three short surveys to complete—pre loan, post loan and three weeks post loan, to

help Surrey Active understand whether these trackers can help people make small lifestyle changes to help improve their physical and mental wellbeing. These are an important part of the trial and as a thank you, after completing all three surveys, there's a draw to win £40 of Love2Shop vouchers!

The Health & Activity Tracker pilot is part of a new collaborative project between Surrey Libraries, Active Surrey, SCC IT & Digital, and University of Surrey to introduce a new service to the libraries: Active Surrey began a new partnership with Surrey Libraries in 2022 to provide opportunities in library settings for residents to take part in activities, events and services that will increase/impact their physical activity levels.

Fleet Street – Meating Sweeney Todd, July 6th



Dr Johnson said "when a man is tired of London he is tired of life" and how true this is. A party of 17 Caterham u3a members joined Guide, Christine Jarvis, for a walk around the Fleet Street area of the City of London.

Our walk began at the statue of Queen Anne in front of St Paul's Cathedral and then on to Carter Lane to see where

the original choristers of St Paul's learned their craft. We learned why the Blackfriars area got its name, saw the last remains of the White Friars monastery, before remembering the work of the many publishing houses whose offices were in Fleet Street. St Brides, known as the Journalist's Church, was resurrected from the ashes of the Great Fire of London by Sir Christopher Wren and its beautiful interior was a pleasure to behold. Then onwards to see the historic Ye Olde Cheshire Cheese Inn, home to the workers who rebuilt London after the Great Fire, then on to see the home of Dr Samuel Johnson, before heading towards our final stop at the Royal Courts of Justice.

Of course, Christine told us the story of the demon barber Sweeney Todd and pie maker Mrs Lovett's pie shop, but it would be wrong to spoil the story for those taking part in the second "Meating Sweeney Todd" walk in August.

Our guide, Christine Jarvis, donated her fee for the day to the Ukraine Red Cross Appeal.

If Paul Knight does get elected to the Chair position, we will need another Publicity Officer, so I am now asking all our membership to think about the Publicity Officer position, and let me or Paul know if you would like to volunteer.

As part of the AGM process, we will be asking members if they wish to stand for the Committee, including the Chair, nearer the time of the AGM in line with our constitution.

Winchester/Bombay Sapphire Visit, 25th May

Our visit to Winchester/Bombay Sapphire Distillery on Thursday 25th May ran very smoothly with no hitches. It was a lovely sunny day and we all met up at our coach pick up points and set off on the journey to the Bombay Sapphire Distillery whre those visiting the Distillery were dropped off and the remaining people continued on to explore Winchester.



At the distillery we began our visit with refreshments in the café before commencing our very interesting tour, which started with a gin and tonic of our choice from three Bombay gins. A good way to start a tour! Whilst enjoying our gin and tonics we watched a short video, followed by a walk round the historic buildings; the site had originally been a paper mill and print works. We visited the Glasshouses, designed by Heatherwick Studios, where samples of the 10 botanicals used in their gins



grow and the dry room, where our guide explained the dried botanicals. We were able to feel, taste and smell the various botanicals that are infused into Bombay Sapphire gin and learn about the vapour infusion distillation process and have a look at the stills were all the




action takes place.

Following our tour (and visit to the shop) we boarded the coach weighed down with our purchases to continue our day in Winchester. Inhabited since prehistoric times, and that King Alfred the Great made his capital, the city has the famous cathedral where Jane Austin is buried, a medieval castle to visit, a maze of cobbled lanes and half-timbered buildings. The pedestrianised High Street is perfect for shopping and there are many old pubs, traditional cafes and a market, so there was lots of choice as to how to spend our time in Winchester.

We left Winchester for the journey back to Caterham. I think a good day was had by all.

Bus Pass Adventurers Group



On the morning of their first trip, members of the new Bus Pass Adventurers Group woke to the sound of thunder and heavy rain. Luckily by 9.30, the time their bus passes could be used, the rain had stopped and the sun was peeking through.

Eleven group members boarded at various stops as the 409 bus proceeded through Caterham. The aim of the group is to go on interesting journeys to interesting places, so we were pleased when the driver turned off the A22 to journey through several small villages which most of us had

never seen before, even though they were not very far from Caterham.

Once we arrived at East

Grinstead we took a stroll up the main shopping street, London Road, until we got to Sackville College Jacobean Almshouse dating back to 1609. We were not able to enter (you can by appointment) but we could admire the beautiful exterior located in an area full of historic buildings. Next to the College is a fascinating statue, erected just a few years ago, dedicated to Sir Archibald McIndoe, the famous surgeon who did pioneering work with airman and soldiers injured in World War 2.

This New Zealand surgeon who, through his pioneering work at the Centre



for Plastic and Jaw Surgery at the Queen Victoria Hospital East Grinstead, reconstructed the faces and hands of the severely burnt Allied Aircrew of the Second World War. He realized that these men were damaged, not only physically, but psychologically too and he encouraged the nurses and residents of the town to socialize with the young airman and to welcome them into their homes during their recuperation. McIndoe and his team treated thousands of men, women and children who suffered burns and similar injuries. He pioneered medical techniques which went on to underpin the future treatment of burns across the world. He also recognised the importance of the social rehabilitation of his patients: 649 Allied Aircrew who went through his operating theatre went on to form The Guinea Pig Club. The townsfolk accepted these men as they went about their daily business and East Grinstead became known as '*The Town that does not stare*'.

Deciding it was time for some refreshment, we walked back down London Road to the Engine Room – a fascinating pub located in a number of small rooms in the basement of an old mill hidden down a narrow alleyway, and serving a range of interesting craft beers. To our surprise it was shut! We discovered that it is not open at lunchtime on weekdays – our recce visit had been on a Friday! Our adventurers' skills soon found an alternative venue for a brief drink before we made our way to Rocca, a Turkish/Mediterranean restaurant.

After an excellent lunch, and having made some new friends, we caught a 409 back to Caterham.

It proved to be a great suggestion, as on 3 June, forty-eight Caterham u3a members set off on a Woods Coaches holiday, with our superb driver Jamie at the wheel.

Despite a few minor pickup problems, we got away on time, and in bright sunshine headed to Dover, where we had rather a long delay at immigration, but still managed to catch our Ferry. To our delight, we were given food vouchers, and enjoyed



a smooth crossing.

Our hotel in Rouen was brand new, and quite close to the city centre, and after an evening meal, a good night's sleep, and an excellent breakfast, we were ready for our first excursion – a visit to the Palace of Versailles. Those of us who had been to Versailles knew what to expect. A lot of people! We were not disappointed! However, the palace and gardens were beautiful, and I guess that those of us who had watched the TV series were trying to spot where scenes were filmed!

It was unfortunate that the little train around the garden closed for lunch, just as some

of us arrived there, exhausted from the tour of the palace. However, the brave few who summoned up the energy to explore the gardens were rewarded with spectacular fountains and formal gardens.

On day two we visited Monet's house and garden at Giverny. It was also packed, but it was still voted the hit of the trip. Once again we were treated to glorious sunshine, and the roses and waterlilies were in full bloom. The day was rounded off with a visit to Rouen, which proved to be absolutely wonderful. The Cathedral, the Joan of Arc church,



and the old town were all beautiful.

Our final day revolved around cheese! - and cider! We

had a very interesting tour of a cheese factory, followed by a tasting which removed the need to find somewhere for lunch. However, the trip to Camembert was a bit of a disappointment. I was certainly expecting a quaint village, or perhaps a small town a bit

like Gouda in Holland or Gruyere in Switzerland. What we found was a church (closed) a museum (which did open, but was rather small) and 3 houses! To be fair, the countryside was beautiful.

The day ended with a visit to Lisieux. This is the second most important pilgrimage site in France, and boasted a rather lovely cathedral and a wonderful basilica, which bore a remarkable resemblance to Sacre Coeur de Notre Dame (and just as enormous!) The problem was that they were rather a long way apart, and a long hill was involved if you wanted to see them both! However, some of us did, and managed to squeeze in a cold beer before the walk back to the coach. None of us could quite see what St Therese to whom the basilica was dedicated had done to deserve quite such a stunning monument, but it was certainly worth a visit.





We had one last "experience"! We stopped on the way back at Le Touquet, and enjoyed a stroll along the "Prom, Prom, Prom" followed by "Moules Frites" before boarding the ferry (no delay this time) for another smooth crossing.

The hotel staff were amazing, and although the hotel lacked a proper bar, I think that everyone enjoyed the fun evenings, with a lovely bar waitress who entertained us to a juggling display each evening. I think that everyone enjoyed the trip, and I was asked so often when the next

one was going to be and where, that I am confident that the trip was a success. Luckily, Deb has volunteered to organise one, and I am happy to lead it.

I have to say that throughout the week, 48 people were on time at every stop when we left, and although many people did not know anybody on the trip, everyone mixed well, and we all had a lot of fun. So a big thank you from me to all the party for your punctuality, and for your determination to enjoy everything.

I've had a steep learning curve with using Publisher, which I've only ever dabbled with previously but hopefully it's come out OK.


