As you will know by now, after 5 years as your chair I will be standing down on 6th February2024. I have thoroughly enjoyed this role but it will be time for me to step down in a little under a year. ## Meet the Committee.....



I am Margaret Bozic and have been a member of Cestria u3a since 2014 when we used to meet in the Red Lion. I was drawn into the group a few months before that when a friend suggested I join her for the Friday walks which were then led and managed by Geoff Taylor. So I joined Cestria u3a rather than one in Washington where I live, and I was made so very welcome.

Did I say I was my Church Treasurer for six years? There is no such thing as an Ex Treasurer. I am now Assistant Treasurer. And I organise walks and talks and weekends away.

# Cestria u3a – Accounts Summary 2022

As Treasurer, for all members unable to attend the AGM on 1<sup>st</sup> February 2023, I would like to take this opportunity to summarise my presentation at the meeting.

Cestria u3a had a bank balance of £4,541 at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022, the balance at 1<sup>st</sup> January 2022 was £4,106, therefore the bank balance had increased by £435 during the year or to put it another way, the u3a had a surplus of £435 during 2022.

During 2023 we have a budget which expects the bank balance to reduce by £350, or to put it another way, the u3a is expected to have a deficit of £350, when the bank balance reduces from £4,541 at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2022 to £4,201 at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2023.
