



Our final Singing for Pleasure under the guidance of Barbara and Dorothy, on Tuesday 28th June 2022











The Beginning of the Cheadle and Gatley U3A Singing for Pleasure Group

Article written by Barbara Wingard for the September 2021 Newsletter in which we celebrated the 10th Anniversary of the formation of our U3A.

It was a very rainy day in June 2011 for the first meeting of the Cheadle and Gatley U3A. Reluctantly I took my car and was amazed to find no available parking anywhere near the URC, so had to drive some distance before finding a space.

I will never forget entering the packed hall to listen to those welcoming us and explaining about the setting up of this new U3A group. Most memorable of all were the words of John Ellison, the U3A North West Region Trustee, who was guiding us. He said in a very firm voice:

'A U3A will succeed only if members volunteer to lead Interest Groups.'

He urged anyone with specialist knowledge or interests and enthusiasm to come forward.

As I came from a very musical background, had sung in many choirs and conducted small groups I decided there and then to volunteer to run a singing group.

At a second meeting 2 weeks later, around the hall there were arranged tables and chairs, a cluster for each Interest Group, with the name of the leader and the group clearly printed. Prospective Group members wandered around and spoke with the leaders about the group. Eventually I had 15 people sign up. At least a third said they had never sung in a choir before, with the rest having had experience at school or afterwards. Some of the original singers are still in the choir today.

At our first rehearsal most of us were in a queue at the entrance while a brave soul at the front struggled with the keys! This gave me the chance to move round and chat to people. Suddenly a lone man appeared and as I approached to welcome him he turned and fled!

What did we sing at our first practice? It had to be something well-known so we sang songs of the British Isles such as *Rule Britannia*, *Loch Lomond*, *Men of Harlech* and *Londonderry Air*. It was a good start. At our second meeting we got a bit more organised with Nuala Lynn offering to keep the register, and Ginny Stephenson in charge of the tea. A little later, to my great relief, Dorothy Walker started to accompany the choir, and what a great support she has been over the years.

Gradually a few brave men joined the group and we eventually had a reasonable bass line. Among the male singers was Ian Ewing who with his guitar skills and vast folk song repertoire was persuaded to do a regular session after the tea break to give the conductor a chance to sit down.

Folk songs with guitar were a great addition to our repertoire, which has included music from the 16th century onwards. In recent times our theme has been post-war American musicals. Starting with *Oklahoma* we found that two members of the choir had attended very early performances. Lee Fairlie had seen the show with her father when it opened in New York in 1945. Rosemary Round told us about her visit to see the show in 1951 at the Opera House in Manchester where it was given a pre-London run.

Other musicals followed such as *Fiddler on the Roof, My Fair Lady* and *West Side Story*, which was possibly our favourite with excellent arrangements for sopranos, altos and basses. We managed pretty well and have been able to include them not only in our U3A concerts but also on other occasions as well. These have included performances at Stockport Town Hall, local care homes and at three churches. At one of the latter in Cheadle Hulme we presented a Victorian musical entertainment which was one of our best efforts. However, perhaps our greatest challenge was the *Hallelujah Chorus*, which was very well received as part of the Christmas entertainment in 2017.

Barbara Wingard was one of our first Group Leaders as she rose to the challenge laid down by John Ellison at our launch meeting in June 2011 for anyone with specialist knowledge to come forward. As she had had a great deal of experience in the musical field she decided to start a singing group – not a 'choir', but a group for anyone who enjoyed singing for pleasure. Right from the start she inspired us with her enthusiasm and encouragement and within a few months we were performing at the U3A Christmas party.

More performances followed at various local venues, such as Stockport Town Hall, different church halls and care homes, and we averaged three public performances a year. Barbara really brought out the best in us and gave us wonderful opportunities to share in music-making which most of us would not otherwise have had. It was exhilarating to raise our voices in well-known songs from the shows and even the Hallelujah chorus!

Barbara was ably supported by Dorothy Walker, our pianist, who had to cope with the vagaries of the hall piano and the limitations of our voices, which she did by transcribing several of our pieces into a more manageable key! Barbara and Dorothy provided us with fortnightly sessions, but they also gave up a lot of their time in planning and preparation. Thanks to their dedication a large number of our members have been able to share in the joy of communal singing and we have all felt the benefits. We will miss them greatly.




