Musings from the Chair

I hope you will have a very good year in 2024.

For the past year I have been trying to provoke you with my Wow! lists. I have covered a lot of categories: man-made structures, popular music, modern novels, opera, films, cathedrals, classic novels, cities, classical music One topic I have steered clear of is STEM science, technology, engineering and mathematics. It is time to ask myself why. I appear to be self-censoring my own main area of expertise and interest, even though these topics are crucial to the society we live in. Without STEM we would not have transport (apart from our feet) communications (apart from our voices) medicine (apart from herbalists) heating (apart from wood fires) in-home entertainment (apart from our voices again) or food from more than 5 miles away. All the topics I have covered in previous months enrich our society but STEM both enriches our society and sustains it in so many practical ways. Why then is it socially acceptable to shrug and say, "I don't understand any of this"?

I had been worrying about this long before I started writing my "musings" and I have concluded that by censoring myself, in deference to my perception of others' preferences, I am part of the problem. So, I will censor myself no longer. Science and engineering are very important to me and to society, so I will and must celebrate them.

If your chairman was an historian, would you expect her not to mention history? If he was a poet, should he never show an appreciation of poetry? If she were a lawyer, should we never hear about the law? For the rest of my tenure as your chair I am going to have an "equation of the month" but before I start, my Wow! topic this month is entropy. It is a brilliant concept which emerged from the hugely important subject of thermodynamics. Yes, I know that is an awful word, disliked even by some scientists and certainly feared by many students, but it only means heat (thermo) and energy (dynamics). The famous first and second laws of thermodynamics were explained to me as "You can't win" (in other words you don't get energy for nothing) and "You can't even break even" (in other words whatever you do, you will lose a bit of energy on the way). Entropy explains how and why you lose that bit of energy and again it can be simply stated without jargon: "Everything tends to get more disordered, and you have to put energy in to make it more ordered again". Think of a teenager's bedroom and you will immediately see what I mean. That's really all there is to it but if you want a splendid literary exposition of entropy, read - or go and see -Tom Stoppard's play Arcadia, which explores the whole concept without once mentioning the actual word. Enjoy.

Greetings from Our New Speaker Secretary

Industrial Heritage 3

Visit to Queensway Mersey Tunnel

Our October visit was to the above, which proved to be very interesting, both historically and technically. In 1922, a committee of representatives from Liverpool City Council and Birkenhead, Wallasey and Bootle boroughs, headed by Sir Archibald Salvidge, leader of Liverpool, considered the building of a bridge or tunnel across or under the Mersey to improve traffic links across the Mersey River. The bridge plan was soon discounted, so a tunnel was decided upon at an estimated cost of £6 million. It was opened with much fanfare by King George V on 18th July 1934 and instantly became a tourist attraction with crowds watching the traffic entering and leaving the tunnel.

The interest continues today as visitors, including our group, choose to pay a modest £10.00 per person for a tour of the tunnel system. The tour commenced from the ground floor reception area by going upstairs to see the original 1934 control room on the fifth floor of Georges Dock Building. In this room the water pumps, ventilation pumps and power supplies were managed initially for the Queensway Tunnel and from 1990, the Kingsway Tunnel. This facility was replaced in 2010 by a combined control centre, which includes the police.

We then went down to the exhaust fan chamber where two fans, each 28ft in diameter and weighing 25 tons, remove the noxious fumes from the tunnel. This is an upgrade on the original plans, as in 1930 users of the Liberty Tunnel in Pittsburgh, USA were seriously affected by carbon monoxide poisoning. The necessary additional ventilation added £2 million to the construction costs. Fresh air is drawn into the tunnel by 25ft diameter fans and forced down 120ft to the roadway.

The tour then continued to the road deck via an access tube where we were able to watch the traffic from a secure area. Each of the four lanes is only 9ft wide so not suitable for some modern vehicles which are directed to the Kingsway Tunnel. Users may notice that whilst the road is straight under the River Mersey, it is not the case where the tunnel runs under land on either side. This is not, as is commonly believed, for geological reasons but simply because the mayors on either side requested that the tunnel did not go under their civic buildings.

Then it was downstairs again to see the lower tunnel which is under the roadway. This was intended for the running of trams, but the Mersey Ferries objected so the plan was scrapped. This area now holds seven emergency refuges.





This proved to be a very interesting visit with Phil and Dan as excellent guides but please be aware that it involves going up and down 800 steps, fortunately, not all at once.
