# Report on the Fees meeting on 30<sup>th</sup> June

The Members Meeting held on Friday 30<sup>th</sup> June approved the fees proposed by the Committee for 2023/24. We thank all members who attended. The draft minutes, with the proposals, can be found on https://u3asites.org.uk/crawley/page/48932.

Membership renewal will be taking place at the usual time, in early September. No fee payments for 2023/24 should be made until members receive their renewal notification.

#### Stamps without a barcode: extension of the expiry date

Regular stamps without a barcode will expire on 31 July 2023. This is an extension of the previous deadline of 31 January that was announced in 2022, after Royal Mail recognised customers needed more time to use up the old stamps. All regular first and second-class 'everyday' stamps will expire, as well as first-class large letter and second-class large letter stamps. International tariff stamps and all 'make-up-value stamps' will also be going out of date. Any old stamps can be swapped for the new barcoded stamps through the Royal Mail's Stamp Swap Out scheme. You will need to complete the <a href="Stamp Swap Out form">Stamp Swap Out form</a> if you have up to £200 worth of stamps to swap, or the <a href="Bulk Stamps Swap Out Form">Bulk Stamps Swap Out Form</a> for more than £200 worth of stamps. There are three ways you can get the Stamp Swap Out form:

Via the Royal Mail website

- By phoning Royal Mail's customer services team on 03457 740740 and asking one to be posted to you for free
- By visiting your local post office where you can pick up a form and envelope in person

If you've printed your own form, you will need to use your own envelope to send the form with your old stamps. If sending less than £200 worth, write on the envelope Freepost SWAP OUT. No other address details or postcode are needed.

# Report on 9<sup>th</sup> June monthly meeting: Seaside 100: A history of the seaside in 100 objects



On such a glorious summer's day what could be nicer than a trip to the seaside? Well, perhaps a virtual trip, led by the very knowledgeable and entertaining Dr Kathryn Ferry, author of two books on the British seaside.

Dr Ferry began with a disclaimer: she would not actually be showing 100 objects, unless we had several more hours to spare, focussing instead on some of the most iconic.

We travelled from Scarborough, which could be called the first English seaside resort when it became a spa for the wealthy health tourists back in the 1620s, to current revitalising of towns like St Ives, with its Tate art gallery. On the way we learnt about bathing machines and huts; travelling by steamer, train or charabanc as the seaside became more accessible to working people. We admired some of the lovely houses, hotels and pavilions built on seafronts, (although we would have stayed in a boarding house, probably with a fierce landlady) and of course we had to share ice creams while watching Punch and Judy on the beach, or an end-of-pier show. Naturally, we had to buy a kiss-mequick hat and be photographed walking on the prom' before heading home.

I think we were all in awe of the amount of information Kathryn was able to include in her delightful talk, and I kept thinking "Wow, I never knew that". The famous Skegness poster of the Jolly Fisherman dates from 1908, for example, and the first Butlins holiday camp was opened by Billy Butlin as long ago as 1936. Remember that for your next pub quiz!

Once again, a very interesting and enjoyable meeting.



#### VoCall voice activated dialler

We have received the following offer from a member whose late mother suffered with severe macular degeneration and was registered blind.

She was very independent and lived on her own and to help her use a telephone they purchased the VoCall voice activated dialler (costing £160) which fits between the incoming BT landline and a standard telephone handset, which once programmed, allows anyone to make telephone calls without physically seeing and dialling any numbers, just by saying a name into the handset mouth piece.

Our member would be happy for someone to have the benefit of this, with the following conditions:

- 1) they would look after it and use it, free of any cost, no catches, but be prepared to hand it back to them, when it is no longer required.
- 2} if broken or damaged whilst in their care, they agree pay any repair/replacement cost

3) try it, then buy it, for £50
