In October some of the members of the Aviation Group visited the <u>Spitfire</u> <u>Heritage Hangar at Biggin Hill</u>. We could not have wished for a better tour guide. His knowledge proved encyclopaedic. Providing new facts and figures to people who by nature of their interest and background have already a fairly extended knowledge of the subject was an achievement. We spent an excellent few hours in his company, and in an environment where all these illustrious aircraft, we know so well, are worked on. The first hangar was largely aircraft maintenance work and components production. Whereas the second hangar was partly a WWII museum and partly static aircraft display. Differences between British and German aircraft

became obvious, with the British being meticulously constructed, whereas some German aircraft showed some of the hurry in which the planes were put together. Interesting also were the different philosophies that produced the beautiful Merlin versus the ME109 Daimler Benz inverted engine. Food for the soul for aircraft buffs.

We got the chance to see a lot of activities close-up, which together with the sounds and smells, added to the experience. The visit was a thorough success and more of these kind of outings will be arranged.

#### Canasta

In the picture the first two groups on the left are Canasta groups trying to obtain seven cards all similar, or with the odd 'wild card' mixed-in.



The other two groups on the right are different, these are examples of Samba. This is a set of seven cards in rank order, all of the same suit. Here the Hearts run from

the Jack to the 7, so just a couple more to go before the Samba is complete. The Clubs however, are complete running from the Ace to the 8. A Samba can run from any card as long as it finishes up with seven cards, so it could go from a 4 to a 10, all in the same suit. 3's are not including in a Samba and Ace is always high. Samba is much more thought provoking; and most people who have learnt it, really enjoy it, and would not change back.

## Cardmaking



An extremely comical afternoon was enjoyed by all, with the authors threatening to stage another production for Christmas 2024.



November: We were set to hear from Delia Taylor about Coco Chanel. Unfortunately she was unwell and we had to resort to our young resident speaker who gave a talk entitled "The Crumbles Murders" which happened in the 1920s. Although unconnected, they both happened in the same area (The Crumbles is where Eastbourne Marina now is), both culprits were tried at Lewis Assizes, both before the same judge, all found guilty, and all three ending up doing the "Hempen Jig" at Wandsworth Gaol.
