How do New Zealand wines compare with those from Devon/The West Country? On Tuesday 6th June the Group addressed this question in a blind tasting of 5 wines from the Marlborough region of the South Island and their exact equivalents made from identical grape varieties grown in this part of the UK. The local wines were:

- 1. A sparkling wine from the Champagne grapes -Chardonnay, Pinot Noir, Pinot Meunier Huxbear Classic Sparkling Brut NV from Chudleigh in the Teign Valley.
- 2. 2022 Pinot Gris from The Calancombe Estate near Modbury.
- 3. 2022 Sauvignon Blanc from Woodchester Valley in the Cotswolds. (Hardly any Sauvignon Blanc is grown in the UK -Woodchester have won gold medals and the top prize for their SB in Global competitions).
- 4. Sharpham Vineyard's 2022 Pinot Rose.
- 5. Sharpham's 2021 still red Pinot Noir.

Whilst all agreed that there was little to choose in quality between the respective wines, without exception the NZ wines were significantly cheaper than their UK counterparts. The standout wine of the evening was the Woodchester Sauvignon Blanc (No change from £20!) Members were asked to select which from each pair they thought was from NZ. Paul and David each scored 5/5.
