Don't forget if you have any ideas for new groups, or any other problems relating to groups, please let me know.



U3A QUILTING GROUP



Our book was *A Rising Man* by *Abir Mukherjee* and the whole group thoroughly enjoyed it. Set in India in 1919, at the time when the Indian independence movements

were beginning to gain ground, the story concerns an English police officer who is recruited to head up a new post in Calcutta. Trying to escape from his experiences in the Great War, Sam Wyndham is catapulted into the rich strangeness of an alien culture. His first task, within a few days, is to solve the murder of an apparent pillar of the British Raj.

Within the social and political minefield that was British India, the book is a clever and engaging detective story combined with an interesting historical novel. The characters are beautifully drawn and there is both humour and outrage at the life of the period. There are other books in the series which we are all looking forward to reading. Highly recommended.

U3A FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

Our speaker this month was Ernest Rushden who gave a very interesting talk on, "A Peterborough lad in the Australian Army in WW1".

Percy Charles Stanley Burks was born in 1893 in Fletton, Peterborough, and later attended The King's School. In 1909 he left school to work at J.R.Smart's accountancy firm in London and then worked as an apprentice in the pianoforte trade. In February 1914, he decided to leave England for Perth Australia, and by November of that year he had enlisted as a private in the Australian Army at Blackbay Hill, Western Australia .

He embarked at Freemantle bound for Gallipoli and then Malta but suffered frequent bouts of dysentery. He was sent back to Wandsworth Hospital London, to convalesce. Later he rejoined his unit and was transferred to the Lewis Gun Section and landed in Marseilles France in 1916. Percy was deemed to have died in August 1916 in the Battle of Pozieres. He has no grave but is commemorated as C.P. Burks on the Villers-Bretonneux Memorial in France. Report: JOSIE SMITH
