## U3A FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

Unfortunately we had to change the planned talk for our October Meeting at the last moment due to internet connection problems at the Community Centre, but hopefully we will be able to hear Stephen Perry's talk in 2022.



Twelve of the Family History Group met in the Community Centre and I spoke of the story of the 'British Home Children', a subject I had learned more about over the first lockdown. A subject not well known in our history. Over 118,000 children from our children's homes and through 50 charities, were sent to Canada to work on farms or as domestics from the 1800's until as late as 1948. Dr Barnardo's sent 33,000 of them. The children were believed by the Canadians to be orphans, but only about 2% of them were. We then watched a video from the British Home Children Advocacy and Research Association about their story which showed many individual photos of the children and told of the horrific treatment some of them received from the families they were sent to.

The desire to get back to the UK was also highlighted by the number of young boys who enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Force in the First World War, knowing they would be sent back to the UK for training before going to France, so reconnect with families again. Suicide was also another way of escaping the torture and horror of their lives. It was not a pleasant video to watch but told a really powerful story.

The scheme not only sent children to Canada but also to Australia, New Zealand and Rhodesia not ending until the 1970's. Prime Minister Gordon Brown in 2010 apologised to the British Home children on behalf of the government for its role in the scheme, the Australian Prime Minister Kevin Rudd had apologised in 2009, but there has been no formal federal apology from the Canadians.

At our November meeting we will hear from Anne Cassidy and the subject will be 'The Military and our Ancestors'.

## U3A LISTENING TO MUSIC GROUP

In October we finally managed a proper meeting at Terry's. We started by expressing our heartfelt thanks to Terry for producing and delivering a disc with a member's programme of music every month since lockdown began. Today's programme was from Anne Jones, with the theme of numbers.

We began with Opus **One**, composed by Gene Krupa and sung by Anita O'Day. From American jazz to very a English folk song: Early One Morning, sung by a tenor and two harp-playing sopranos. Purcell's Fantasia on one note played by London Baroque preceded a lovely rendition of Inchworm by Danny Kaye and the Muppets.

Poulenc's **Four** motets for Christmas were followed by Hammerstein's 'I am **16** going on **17**'. A numerical leap of **50** took us to Route **66** sung by Nat King Cole before travelling to Iowa for **76** Trombones and a live performance from the Proms. The Bible gave us three figure numbers in the form of Psalms, **100**, **122** (two versions) and **150**. The Parry setting of 'I was glad' for the 1953 Coronation included the shouted "Vivats" by the choirs. The penultimate piece was Honnegar's Pacific **231** which ably captured, in music, the journey of that train from slowly starting to gently coming to a halt after speeding across the USA.

Finally we heard the full choral version of Tchaikovsky's **1812**Overture, a fitting ending to our numerical journey. Thank you Anne and Terry for the programme and Liz for the drinks and biscuits, so important when listening to music!

## U3A ART APPRECIATION GROUP

## TOULOUSE LAUTREC 24/11/1864 -9/09/1901 (aged 36)

Comte Henri Marie Raymond de Toulouse-Lautrec-Monfa was a French painter, printmaker, draughtsman, caricaturist and illustrator whose immersion in the colourful and theatrical life of Paris in the late 19th Century allowed him to produce a collection of enticing, elegant and provocative images of the modern, sometimes decadent affairs of those times.



He has become associated with the world of Moulin Rouge. He was the first of the poster designers. He suffered from a rare genetic bone disorder (PYCD) that resulted from a fracture of both thighs at the same time. The fractures took a long time to heal and the bones didn't grow again. This resulted in his having a body of a man whilst having the legs of a child. He was 5feet 1 inches tall.

The disease's long name is pycnodysostosis if you want to look it up!!



His art works are known worldwide. Unfortunately he was an alcoholic for much of his life and died of syphilis. He is buried in Verdelais, Gironde, a few kilometres from his birth place.


local U3A Singing groups from Peterborough, Spalding and Stamford for a joint Sing Along organised by the Stamford Group.
