Lots of chat, not necessarily about gardening! Hope to see you all next year.



As the plot develops, however, we discover that the 'daughter' is in fact a mythological mermaid or sea creature girl he is keeping caged as a scientific freak.

We are plunged into a gothic mystery involving a sympathetic ghost, freak shows, criminals, and grave robbers, all told with a wonderful eye is a book that requires a willing suspension of disbelief and a liking for the strange and supernatural, given which, it is very satisfying.
