CHURCH MICE GROUP



December's visit was to St John's church in the centre of Peterborough. We were treated to an illustrated talk by June and Vernon about the church based on their enormous collection of postcards of Peterborough.

The original St John's was built around 1078 near the present site, but that wooden building was prone to flooding and a new building was constructed on the present site in 1402. There was originally a spire but when major alterations were made in the early 19th century it was removed.

Inside the church there are many memorials to Peterborough citizens including Edith Cavell. There is a fine modern elaborate high altar and many stained-glass windows mainly Victorian.

Everyone contributed and we had a delightful morning of different offerings, all with a Christmas flavour.


The very enjoyable refreshments were provided by Liz.

All the ladies, however, agreed that one might learn much about the social life of the time from such reading, and were especially engaged by such descriptions of the life of the fair sex of the period as to make them very sure that it would not have suited them to have lived such lives.
