I have recently enjoyed inspiring visits to art galleries. The National Gallery is hosting models of the seven short-listed sculptures for the fourth plinth in Trafalgar Square – the one which changes every couple of years. You can access them on line and maybe even vote for your favourite!



At the National Portrait Gallery was a collaborative piece with students remembering refugees who came to UK from the Basque country in the late 1930s, fleeing from the Spanish Civil War, which included an interpretation based on Picasso's harrowing "Guernica" painting.

I've also visited the extensive exhibition at Peterborough Cathedral, featuring the work of local artists in a variety of media. There is currently an exhibition at Peterborough Museum of the work of William Wood, who was commissioned to record, in watercolour, scenes of Peterborough, before major changes were to take place in the city.

CHURCH MICE

28 members of Church Mice visited St Guthlac's church in Market Deeping in February. Members of Church Mice who are members of St Guthlac's did all the arrangements. Lyall Seale, who helped to start Church Mice more than a dozen years ago, gave a full account of the church. It was built in the 12th Century and has had many changes since, particularly towards the end of the 19th Century. Lyall talked of Joan Plantagenet, mother of Richard II and Margaret Beaufort, mother of Henry VII, both of whom were connected with Market Deeping.

There are a number of stained-glass windows, the most notable of which are the two St Guthlac windows which have 12 roundels showing the life of St Guthlac. These were copied from the Guthlac Roll which is one of the most important illuminated manuscripts held in the British Library.

After the talk and a walk round the church, the members went across the road to have tea and cakes organised by yet another member of Church Mice.

Going back to basics, we watched a video of one of the Find My Past experts explaining how to get more from searches on the website.

Mary McKee talked us through some of the many categories available on the site and also different ways of searching. Wild cards are something we don't always think of using, asterisks to substitute letters, sometimes names can be spelled in many different ways. Question marks or even advanced searches and the wave icon plus a number searching a newspaper article to find things within a limited number of words are a new feature. A new viewer has now been developed for the site for the newspapers which hopefully by now is being used to make the site more user-friendly and the availability of a new crop feature so that you can now print out only the article on the page you want. All useful features that may have been missed for the occasional user of Find My Past.

For our next meeting we will be discussing "Free websites" that we can use to gather information at no cost.

We also welcomed a new member to the group: Anne Holmes.



The book was *Unsheltered* by Barbara Kingsolver. Set in America, in a small township which was built by a 19th Century entrepreneur as a vanity project, the story followed two families living on the same plot of land in widely separated periods of time. One, in the original period, the other in contemporary times. There were cleverly managed parallels between the two strands of the book, and the two families. Along the way, issues such as the effect of Darwinism on the Creationists running the education system, the contemporary problem of climate change, and the complex interaction of the families as they struggle to deal with

their problems, similar in many ways, despite the time gap, are well drawn and the characters are interesting and engaging.

Not a beach read, perhaps, but for those of us who liked it, a satisfying one!

a shorter walk. This proved possible so that everyone was catered for.


We all returned by car to the Golf Club where we were well looked after and served a tasty lunch. It was an enjoyable morning, especially so as the sun shone for us after all that rain!
