

Sophie Hannah is an excellent crime writer who has assumed the mantle of Agatha Christie to give Poirot a few more mysteries to solve. She gives an unlikely scenario credibility and weaves an intriguing story in tracking down the murderer. An interesting read. Highly recommended.

Twenty three members of Church Mice visited St Mary's Church at Cowbit on a misty yet sunny December day. Cowbit itself dates from pre-Roman times and the name means 'cow pasture'. The church dates from the late 14th century and earlier supplied Spalding Priory with 'fish, fowl and swans', and in return the priory dealt with Cowbit's spiritual needs. From the outside the church looks slightly odd, with a leaning tower (obviously due to fen shrinkage) and a mixture of red brick and Barnack stone.

Inside the church is compact and welcoming, consisting of a nave and small chancel. Additions in the late 15th century lengthened the church and added the tower. The roof would have been thatched until the early 19th century. There are a number of fine late-Victorian stained glass windows, one of which features a swan. In the chancel there are four interesting corbels of human faces, probably predating the church, as possibly does an interesting font. After a very informative and interesting talk from Pauline, members enjoyed lovely cakes and tea.
