The church dates from the end of the 12th century, although there was an Anglo Saxon wooden church on the site before. From the outside the fine bell tower has notable flying buttresses added in the 17th century. Inside the nave has three Norman arches on each side leading to a quite lengthy chancel. Within the chancel there is a fine effigy of a knight opposite which is a monument to the



Manners brothers, one of whom was esquire to Queen Mary. There are some fine stained glass windows dating back to Victorian times when the church was restored. The Bertie family has supported the church for the last few centuries and most of the additions have been funded by them. Notable in the nave are the very fine elaborately carved stone corbels and a fine chandelier.

We were entertained by a wide ranging witty talk from Michael Crowe and then provided with a fine tea and cakes.
