


Book GROUP

NEWS FROM THE GROUPS

WALKING GROU

The walking group continues to meet once a fortnight. We are continuing to hold our active walkers' numbers at 20. Further enlargement of the group could lead to difficulties in finding sufficiently large car parks and post-walk cafes, and keeping tabs on a large group during limited-visibilty (woodland) walks can be an issue too.

We started our activities this year with a walk around the Cromarty estate. Cromarty is overflowing with historical interest, but perhaps less well known is the nearby "pirates graveyard", so called because many of its gravestones are decorated with the skull and crossbones. This site, St. Regulus burial ground, also features an open underground vault (photo 1), all that remains of an earlier chapel, used by deceased occupants of nearby Cromarty House.



Rather better weather was available for our next route around the road-free northeast shores of Loch Ness, including a view of the recently renovated Aldourie Castle (photo 2). You can rent this privately - prices are not highlighted on the website! Our next walk took us from Avoch to views above Munlochy Bay (photo 3) on a lovely day, but violent gales rather interfered with plans for the next walk around the woods above Culbokie. However, our intrepid walk leader found a way around the fallen trees to viewpoints





looking over to the Ben Wyvis range. Icy weather meant that we only had one walk in March, around the woods and rivers surrounding Cawdor Castle. Unusually for castles in these unruly parts, it has survived largely unscathed over the centuries and is still lived in today.

Thank you to those group members (Michael & Elisabeth) who took two of these walks.

Our Group evolved from a few of us chatting at the last coffee morning, three of us expressed a desire to learn crochet, while a fourth said she loved to crochet and would be happy to teach us!

We meet fortnightly and at the moment we are concentrating on crochet, but we all have different talents, so other crafts will be pursued, each member taking on the role of 'teacher' Others may just bring their ongoing project while enjoying the craic.

First Monday of each month, 10am to 12 noon.


