Prior to the AGM we have a Group Leaders meeting on 2nd April in Priory Place Methodist Church at 12.30 p.m. and this will be followed by a New Members meeting at 2.00 p.m. in the same room. Perhaps 'New Members' is a bit of a misnomer as we welcome anyone who would like to find out more about U3A and particularly those who have not yet joined any groups or would like a group starting that we don't already have.

For those who are interested in the programme of outings proposed for the Travel Group – I have had one or two enquiries. Please join the Travel Group and come to the meetings. You will then be sent the information that Vanessa Whaley has compiled for members.

Interesting times ahead for DU3A. We hope you will come and make your views known.

LOVE OF NATURE Denaby Ings - 5th February 2019

On a very frosty morning 16 members met at the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust Reserve in the Dearne Valley with binoculars at the ready to locate and identify birds. We had been alerted to a recent sighting of a great grey shrike but realistically weren't expecting that it would still be around.

When everyone had arrived we set off into the reserve and almost straight away came to a feeding station where we saw several blue tits, great tits and robins

feeding on fat balls. The lake to the left of the footpath was frozen solid with, initially, not one bird in sight. To the right of the footpath through the tree line we could see the river where the water was flowing freely allowing several tufted ducks to swim upstream.

As we continued walking round the reserve we could see several birds on the surface of the water including shelduck, mallard, coot and black-headed gull. Behind them were several trees and perched on their branches were seven or eight cormorants and two heron. We lingered awhile discussing the finer aspects of cormorant ID then continued following the path round the lake back to the car park.

We then adjourned to a nearby pub 'The Pastures', where we enjoyed a well earned lunch. (The carvery looked particularly good?)





I have been painting since I was a teenager in Sheffield in the 1960s. Although I undertook no formal art training I was inspired and advised by the art teacher at my secondary school, Clarence Helliwell, who allowed me to use the art room in my lunchtimes and free periods.

My great grandfather, David Payne, was a successful professional artist in Derby and Sheffield. He painted Queen Victoria's Jubilee visit to Derby which hangs in the city art gallery. Although my father did not pursue an artistic career, he inherited an ability to draw expertly and encouraged me to do the same.

I sold my first painting in the Sheffield Graves Art Gallery Open Exhibition in 1965 for 20 guineas which was very encouraging. That same year I was awarded a scholarship to study geography at St Edmund Hall, Oxford. Painting took a bit of a back seat then although I exhibited at exhibitions there, selling work to fellow students and some academics, including the then Warden of New College, Sir William Hayter.





After getting my degree, I studied for an MA in Town and Regional Planning at Sheffield University from 1968 to 1970 when I got a job in the Planning Department of Norfolk County Council. On Local Government Reorganization in 1974, I moved to Broadland District Council. My time in Norfolk led me

to develop an affection for the Norfolk countryside and coastal scenery which provided many good subjects.



I moved to Doncaster for a post in the planning department in 1977, continued painting and joined Doncaster Art Club. I became the Club's Chair in 1995 and haven't yet found anyone to take over the role! Since retirement, from my final professional 20 years as a Planning Inspector, I have had more time to spend on Club matters and to paint.

I work principally in oils, but also enjoy watercolour and pastels. I concentrate mainly on landscapes and townscapes, with occasional seascapes and harbour scenes also. It is said that I am possibly best known for painting

trees and foliage and I certainly find such subjects challenging in any season. Although self taught I have benefited greatly from the advice and companionship of fellow members of the Art Club.







Mike is a member of Doncaster U3A and is hoping to exhibit around 30 of his paintings at the Scicluna Deli just next to Doncaster's market. The tiny exhibition space in the coffee shop holds a monthly changing show by a collection of very different artists, some local, some not, but all creating wonderful small works to view and to buy. Mike's pictures will be on display during March 2019 so do go along to the Deli. (Monday to Saturday, 9.00 a.m. - 5.00 p.m). 10 per cent of sales will go to Scicluna's chosen charity 'Let the Children Live'. Further information about future deli artists can be found at:

Oak Apple Day 29th May 2019

Oak Apple Day, also known as Royal Oak Day, used to be a public holiday in England. It commemorated the anniversary of the day that King Charles II returned to London from exile overseas after the Restoration of the English Monarchy. Although it is not an official holiday anymore, it is still informally celebrated in some areas.

The Battle of Worcester took place in 1651 during the English Civil War. The future Charles II of England managed to escape the Parliamentarian troops by hiding in an oak tree in Boscobel wood. A Parliamentarian soldier passed directly below the tree but did not notice Charles. The tree was later named the Royal Oak.

After the Restoration, Parliament declared May 29 (the King's birthday) a formal public holiday. It was named Royal Oak Day or Oak Apple Day.

Royal Oak Day was formally abolished in 1859, but is still celebrated in some parts of the country. It is sometimes referred to as Ooh look, its the King!, Oak and Nettle Day, or Shick Shack Day. On this day, people wore oak apples or oak leaves. Those who failed to do so might be thrashed with nettles or pelted with bird's eggs.

- Royal Hospital Chelsea was founded by Charles II. Historically, a member of the Royal Family visits the hospital in London close to May 29, the hospital's Founder's Day, to review the pensioners, who wear sprigs of oak leaves. In addition, a statue of Charles II, in Figure Court, is partly covered with oak leaves for the day.
- St Neots, in Cornwall, hosts the most lavish celebrations. Events include the hauling of an oak bough to the top of the church tower (where it remains all year) to symbolise allegiance to the Crown. Old Cornwall Society branches are represented with banners and the church bells are rung, while dancing and other entertainments follow and many people attend wearing seventeenth century costume.
- In Great Wishford, Wiltshire, villagers claim their ancient right to collect wood from Grovely Wood on Oak Apple Day. Residents take an oak bough, which is then decorated and hung from the parish church tower. In order to maintain their charter, villagers proclaim their right at a ceremony in Salisbury Cathedral in which they repeat the refrain: 'Grovely, Grovely and all Grovely'. Although the charter requires just three 'Grovelys', there are usually four 'Three for the charter and one for us'.
- In Castleton, in the Peak District, 'Garland Day' sees the Garland King (Jack-in-the-Green) covered in flowers and leaves and led on horseback through the town, followed by maypole and Morris dancing.
- In the centre of Northampton, the statue of Charles II at All Saints' Church is garlanded with oak leaves at noon.
- Upton-upon-Severn (Worcestershire), Aston on Clun (Shropshire) and Marsh Gibbon (Buckinghamshire) also mark the day.

You can visit the oak tree where Charles II hid at Boscobel in Staffordshire – it is not the original tree but a direct descendant.

Did you know?

.... 'The Royal Oak' is the third most popular pub name, and multiple Royal Navy warships have been called 'Royal Oak'.
