From the Chair

A plan to set up a network of u3as within a locality which is geographically connected has been proposed. In Doncaster's case the network will certainly include other South Yorkshire and probably some north Lincolnshire u3as. Such successful networks already exist in other parts of Great Britain.

Their objective is to create a framework within which mutual growth can be achieved, aiming to raise the

profile of the organisation, but not to add another layer of bureaucracy. On February 22nd I, as your Chair, our Vice Chair and Secretary attended an exploratory meeting of potential u3a members and we shall give a full report at the next Committee Meeting and encourage du3a, as a group, to participate. We shall report on its outcome in due course.

On a much more local level the call for prospective committee members for the forthcoming year is repeated here. Under the rules no committee member can serve for more than two years without re-election, so a healthy stream of new candidates is desirable. That is in no way to denigrate the work of the 2022/23 committee, whose commitment and ability to work as a team has been exemplary.

It is well known now that our monthly general meeting has had a name change. It is, from now on, to be known as a Members' Meeting. The idea is to make it more welcoming and inclusive in order to attract a larger attendance. This in no way prevents members from bringing along a new prospective member, in order to introduce them to our du3a.

During the year I have been in the Chair I found that there was much to learn in order to perform effectively. The learning curve was mostly to do with communication – with The Third Age Trust, The Charities Commission, via Zoom and of course our own membership by way of Beacon. To this end I have compiled a Chair Induction Training Programme which over two half-hour sessions gives all the access details which need to be known to make effective contact with all parties.

It must be said that effective chairmanship can only be achieved by drawing on the combined knowledge and experience of current and former committee members. Their pool of information is essential.

By the time this newsletter is in circulation we shall already be in early Spring. Do you, like me, wonder where the time goes?




Being able to participate in such a wide range of activities is great - it provides me with some social interaction and the opportunity to keep my mind active.



FAMILY HISTORY


