From the Chair

We hope you are through the worst Carole and that we will be seeing more of you in the future. I'm delighted that Jill Laming will be remaining as Membership Secretary – one of the most important committee roles which Jill carries out diligently on our behalf and has done so for many years.

We are going to welcome – I hope – Nora Boyle who has agreed to be minutes secretary, if elected, another job that Mark Frost has done for most of the last 12 months. This is in conflict with our constitution which states that no one person can hold two officer posts, so we will look for someone else to be Business Secretary. Our aim is to break the committee roles down into smaller parts and have different people taking responsibility for just one part so that it is less work for one person. Please do step forward if you are willing to help out.

This month I have been to the AGM of the Yorkshire and Humber Region (YAHR). It is always good to remind ourselves that we belong to both a regional and a national organisation. The meeting was held in Leeds and while a train from Doncaster to Leeds is quick and easy there were others, from the Yorkshire Dales for example, who had left home at 6.30 a.m. in order to get there for 10.00 a.m. Diane and Chris Woolven will be attending the Barnsley Spring School and tutoring on a workshop on Genetic Fingerprinting – I look forward to hearing how it went.

The major National Event is the Annual Conference which will once again be held in the East Midlands Conference Centre on the Nottingham University Campus. Again we are lucky that we don't have far to travel to get there. The committee have sanctioned the purchase of two places, I will be one, but I would welcome company from another member who wishes to find out more about the National Organisation and meet people from other U3As. The dates are 27th -29th August and there are no additional costs apart from drinks, although tea and coffee are included. Who would like to go?

The U3A Nature Watch group met in April at Potteric Carr Reserve for bird watching. We were led by Andy from the Reserve.

It was a cloudy, cool and damp morning for our walk. Our purpose was to listen to, watch and observe the bird life.

As soon as we left the Centre we saw Marsh Harriers flying over the lake. Walking on through the reserve we admired the blackthorn blossom and wild primula. Our guide identified numerous bird songs as we walked along and we listened to chiffchaff, great tits, chaffinch, song thrush, blackcap, wren, and Cetti's warbler and we glimpsed some of the varieties high in the trees. We soon reached an area on the reserve of felled trees. Our guide explained that leaving the trees was a way of creating and encouraging a natural habitat for rarer breeds such as the increasingly rare willow tit. We were also fortunate to see wild deer in adjoining fields as we walked to one of the hides.

We stopped at the Piper Marsh hide identifying on the banks and water various types of ducks – pochard, shoveller, gadwall and teal. We also observed greylag and Canada geese, coots and snipe.

Returning to the Centre, we had all enjoyed a very informative guided bird tour – all being much wiser about our many varied feathered friends!!





- (25) A bicycle costs 15 guineas and a boy has saved £7 15s 6d towards it. How much does he still need?
- (26) From 6,754 take 4,567
- (27) A workman working 8 hr. a day tales 3 days to build a wall. If he is paid 2s 6d an hour what would his wages amount to?
- (28) By how much is 0.5 of £1 greater than 0.05 of £1?

The above are taken from an actual test paper.

Following on from the test papers on the previous page consider the following units of measure.

Many people found the change to the decimal system fairly difficult to handle but oh how simple it is now compared to the past. Below are some of the units of measure that we may be familiar with and many which are new to us.

LENGTH

Well-known units - inch, foot, yard, mile

<u>Land measurement</u> - furlong, chain, link, rod, pole, perch, Ramsden's chain

Nautical units - fathom, shackle, cable, nautical mile

The human body - foot, hand, palm, nail, finger

Old units - span, cubit, ell, bolt, cloth-yard, league, megalithic yard

Small units - line, thou, barleycorn, poppy seed

3 hands is 1 foot Hands are used to measure horses.

A palm was 3 inches

A nail was 2 and a quarter inches. It was a cloth measure.

A finger was 4 and a half inches. Another cloth measure.

WEIGHT

Well-known units (avoirdupois) - ounce (oz), pound (lb), stone

Large units (avoirdupois) - quarter, hundredweight (cwt), ton

Small units (avoirdupois) - dram, grain

Troy weights - pennyweight, troy ounce, troy pound

Apothecaries' weights - scruple, apothecaries' drachm, apothecaries' ounce,

apothecaries' pound

<u>Jewel weights</u> - carat, point

VOLUME

Well-known units - pints, gallons, quarts

Smaller units - fluid ounce, gill, cup, fluid drachm, minim, spoons

Dry units - peck, bushel, other units

Beer casks - pin, firkin, kilderkin, barrel, puncheon, tun, hogshead, butt

<u>Cubic measures</u> - cubic inches, feet and yards

Wood measures - cord, cord foot, rick, fathom, Hoppus foot

Other cubic measures or volumes - shipping ton, perch, old Scottish measures

Old Scottish measures:

4 gills = 1 mutchkin

2 mutchkins = 1 chopin

2 chopin = 1 pint

A Scottish gill was about 3/4 Imperial gills.

A Scottish pint was about 2 Imperial pints 4 gill.

This was because in Scotland, there were 16 gills to the pint rather than 4

MONEY

Coins - farthing, half penny, penny, three pence, six pence, shilling, florin, half crown

Notes - ten shilling, one pound, five pound, ten pound

Older money - crown, guinea, groat, sterling

The Scottish currency was abolished at the Act Of Union 1707: VALUE IN STERLING

SCOTS (before 1707)

2 pennies = 1 bodle

2 bodles = 1 plack

3 bodles = 1 bawbee 1 bawbee = 1 English halfpenny 2 bawbees = 1 shilling 1 Scots shilling = 1 English penny

13 shillings 4 pence = 1 merk

20 shillings = 1 pound 1 Scots pound = 20 English pence (1/8)
