



WINTHROP GARDENS



Report on the U3A National Conference



One again the National Conference was held in the East Midlands Conference Centre at Nottingham University. We are lucky that it is so near to Doncaster – others come from Cornwall, Scotland, Northern Ireland and all places in between. I was accompanied by Jane Page who was soon making friends all over the place!!

Both Jane and I attended a number of workshops and Jane will report separately on those she attended. I felt duty bound to go to Trustees, Treasurers and U3A Finance. This reinforced the message that Trustees are responsible for all finance and assets, including Group finance and assets – so no change there. One of the things the Committee are grappling with at the moment is whether we should ask the bank if we can have a bank card and/or online banking. I took a straw poll of those attending the workshop and roughly half those attending use both already.

My second workshop was on Cyber Crime – it is amazing how ingenious criminals are when trying to part you from your money.... The presenters included an ex policeman who now works as a civilian for the police on raising awareness of all aspects of cyber crime. I will report on some of the scams in other editions of the newsletter.

The eighty four year old presenter of the Memory Workshop was loud and clear in his message that how well your brain works depends largely on you. To sum up, he was saying use it or lose it! He advocated what he called gentle stimulus – this could be something as simple as always making an effort to remember someone's name when you meet for the first time and he demonstrated tricks to help with this. He ended by memorising the order of 26 playing cards. An impressive feat.

We attended a variety of presentations in the main auditorium including the Key Note Speaker, Ernie Rea, who broadcasts regularly on Radio 4. He spoke on the Medici, Florence and the Golden age of Art – it made you want to rush out and buy a ticket to Florence. He was followed by the AGM which included the financial report. If you are interested in knowing more about the Third Age Trust, our national organisation, and how it operates, you should look on the National U3A Website.

There are two main activities being carried forward by the National Executive at the moment – one is the implementation of the Development Plan and the other is the development/replacement of the Beacon System. Collectively we are a large organisation but we have a very small staff of 14 in the London Office. Only kept this small by the many volunteers who help by answering phones etc. Your committee

asked me to write to the National Chairman, Chief Executive and Beacon Lead to express our concerns at the approach they are taking with Beacon – our much loved membership system. This I have duly done and I await their reply with interest. They are proposing replacing Beacon completely with an off the shelf system whereas we would like them to update it.

One change that is being implemented immediately is the removal of the phrase 'University of the Third Age' from the logo. We are now asked to use the logo with the 'Learn, Laugh and Live' strap line on any publicity materials. The word University confuses people and therefore we are being asked not to use it.

Those who use the U3A diary should note that we are not intending selling them this year. The price has gone up to \pounds 3.25 and it is normally the Treasurer who sells them – being without a Treasurer at the moment we will not be offering them for sale.

The conference is useful to keep Doncaster U3A up-to-date with national developments and to meet and discuss with others the way their U3A runs. It is very true that no two U3As are the same and each try their best to meet the needs of their members in their own way.

David and I are just back from the fringe again. This is our sixth fringe in a row and I cannot imagine a time when we don't go!

David's show, The Glummer Twins, **theglummertwins.com** was again on at the Fringe for week 3. His time slot was 2.00 p.m., so we had lovely lazy mornings with friends. Seven of us go and we share a very beautiful Victorian apartment that stretches over two floors - very expensive but shared between us it becomes reasonable.

My role is simple - taking tickets and getting people in and out. Should there be an emergency I'm responsible for flicking the house lights on and asking everyone to leave it's never happened thank goodness!

So, after about 4.00 p.m. we go to see other shows, carefully chosen and booked by one of our group who has 30 years experience in that department.

There are shows of every kind, the majority costing around eight pounds per person, to make you laugh, cry, marvel, wonder and delight and we saw some utterly wonderful shows.

We also saw a smattering of famous people in the crowds, including Stephen Fry and Hugh Laurie, but the absolute pinnacle for me was Sir Ian McKellen! Not only did I stare at him quite a lot, but I also engineered following him out in the crush, breathing in the same air and I also managed to touch him lightly with a surreptitious index finger..... sad, I know, but I'm unrepentant!

There are also lots of very interesting shops and noteworthy galleries to experience. The Edinburgh Hat Shop is a keen favourite of ours. There is no shortage of places to eat during the day and at night and there are many very good pubs and bars.



The Fringe is a very good experience that I thoroughly recommend. A reasonable fitness level is necessary because there's lots of walking, though taxis are plentiful when needed. You also need lots of stamina to tackle the huge programme, but planning is vital - one of our experienced members double booked himself this year!
